—A NOTABLE IMPROVEMENT. The work on the St. Lawrence Church, Morrell, is now completed and it stands one of the prettiest churches of its size on the Island. It has been painted within and without, a new chimney erected and two new furnaces installed during the past summer. The exterior is painted maroon with darker trim and although this structure was erected almost 70 years ago such was the material used that it is almost in perfect condition today and in the opinion of experts is good for a century more. The inside was finished in maple, this being the work of a former pastor Rev. A. A. McAulay. To see it now in much of its original beauty, recalls, especially to older parishioners, the love, toil, yes, and oftentimes hardships, spent by this good man in order to make of it a worthy place of worship. Both in material and workmanship it stands as a monument to those men of a former age. Although much credit is due to the decorators, Messrs. Murphy and Sampson, their work could not have shown to such advantage except for the beautiful foundation. The chimney and new furnaces are giving every satisfaction thus combining beauty and comfort and the whole combination reflecting great credit on all who helped to forward the good work.—Onlooker.

—CHURCH BEAUTIFULLY FINISHED. The work on the St. Lawrence Church, Morrell, is practically finished and reflects great credit on everyone concerned in it. A large outside chimney has been built which has proven very satisfactory. The exterior has been painted maroon with darker trimmings and presents a very pleasing appearance. This structure was erected upwards of seventy years ago and such was the material and workmanship used that it stands to-day in almost perfect condition and in the opinion of experts is good for a century more. The interior which was beautifully finished in hardwood, has been painted maroon with white and gold trimmings and the pillars are an imitation marble. The altars also have been decorated and look very well. The painters, Messrs. Murphy and Sampson, are to be congratulated on the work done. This work alone would place them in the front rank of their profession. Although they place most of the credit to the very beautiful finish and work which was used on this building never before could it be seen to such advantage as now. This work was planned and executed by a former pastor, Rev. A. A. McAulay and the sight of it now recalls clearly, especially to the older parishioners, the love, zeal and oftentimes hardships this beloved pastor expended to make of this edifice a worthy place of worship, and it stands to-day as a memorial to the thoroughness and care with which he planned and also to the good workmanship of those builders of a past age. This church as it now stands is second to none on the Island. The new heating apparatus is also giving every satisfaction, thus combining comfort and beauty.
