ON May 29th, Samuel Foss, one of the oldest and most respected inhabitants of Vernon River, passed peacefully to rest, aged seventy nine years and nine months. Although prevented for many years on account of deafness from enjoying public worship, Mr. Foss had a wide knowledge of the Scriptures, and died as he had lived with simple faith and trust in God. His remains were laid to rest in the Methodist cemetery at Vernon River. He leaves to mourn a widow and one son on the homestead and four sons and one daughter in the United States.—Com.

A STRANGE tale has just come to light, of how two hundred citizens of Ottawa attended a hanging armed with loaded revolvers. It was at a time when Fenianism was rampant in Ireland and the United States, and when there were Fenian circles in Montreal, Ottawa and other Canadian cities. In 1867, Thomas D'Arcy McGeer contested Montreal as a candidate for its representation in the House of Commons. He was bitterly opposed by the Fenian element among his own countrymen. Apparently his death was then decided upon, and a few months afterwards he was murdered. The assassin was discovered, arrested and condemned to death. A Fenian rescue was expected, and two hundred Ottawa citizens took the precaution to attend the hanging to see that justice was not interfered with. The details of the story are entertainingly told in the August Canadian Magazine by J. E. McCready, the veteran journalist, who was in Ottawa at the time.
