(Continued from First Page.)

ment of a poll clerk. He did not know of any other business being done, or how many bottles, empty or full, were in his barn.

Cross examined by Mr. Peters.—Mr. Hume put his horse in McLean's stable. He always supported Mr. McKinnon and it was not necessary for McKinnon to canvass him. Mr. Hume said nothing to him about his vote.

To Mr. Stewart.—He did not work for Mr. McKinnon.

Angus Cameron (sworn) and examined by Mr. McLean.—He lived at Lot 61 and voted at St. Mary's Road poll. He was at McLean's barn and had a little smile. He thought it was whiskey, but he could not tell who gave it to him. He went to harness Mr. Bruce's horse at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. He did not see any one else drinking in the barn.

Cross-examined by Dr. Pugsley.—He was always a political supporter of Mr. McKinnon. He would swear positively that the liquor was not given to influence his vote.

Daniel McNulty (sworn) and examined by Mr. McLean.—He lived at Murray Harbor and voted at last Dominion election. He held a conversation with Graham about the election and Graham treated him and told him if he would vote for Mr. McKinnon he would be well paid after the election.

Bismarck Craswell (sworn) and examined by Mr. McLean. He attended meetings of Liberal organization and gave name of president, secretary and committee. Meetings were held twice during the election campaign. He knew Jas. Matheson of Rustico but did not treat him with liquor during election campaign. He had liquor during campaign. He treated him in the summer time. He did not canvass him. He had liquor on election day for treating electors. He got four bottles of liquor at Stephenson's Mills. He saw James Matheson taking a drink on election day. He understood Jas. D. McMillan took the liquor there. He took liquor into Craswell's store but could not remember all who were in there. He could not say whether Matheson got some of the liquor which he took in or not. He had a glass and any one who wished could get a drink of liquor. He swore positively that Matheson did not get liquor out of his bottle. He saw a number of bottles in a bag probably sixteen. He received a circular from Mr. McKinnon.

John McKinnon (sworn) and examined by Mr. Stewart. He lived in Black River and voted at Brackley Point. He had intoxicating liquors during campaign—about a case. He got it on the main street. He went into an office and a man gave him an order. He went up Patriot stairs. He was not directed to Mr. McKinnon's office. He saw some of his friends around a door and when they saw him coming they said there is a good man. He got a note there to go down main street. He could not say whether the man who gave him the note was young or old. When he went up Patriot stairs he turned in the first door on the right hand side and got the order. He knew he had to go to Angus McDonald's and to get a case. It was good brandy and a lot of the old ladies drank it. It was about a week before election. He did what he liked with the liquor. He treated political friends and foes. One man came to his house three times but he would not give him any. He used half of it and treated just as they came.

Court then adjourned.

On Motion of Mr. Stewart an order for contempt was issued against Wellington Mutch, returnable Monday next. Mr. Stewart read an affidavit of service by William Taylor, stating he jumped on Mutch's sleigh and attempted to serve the subpoena and Mutch knocked him off. Attorney General Peters complained to Court that an old man who was subpoenaed as a witness had to stand up during the trial. Mr. Justice Hodgson said it was not right and the Sheriff ought to see to it that all witnesses had proper attention paid to their wants. He had no doubt the Sheriff would do his best.

EXCELLENT SESSION

East Prince Sunday School Association

HELD ON MONDAY LAST

In the Searletown Methodist Church--The Program Rendered.

One of the grandest conventions of the South East Prince Sunday School Association was held in the Searletown Methodist Church, Monday, Jan. 28th with a large attendance. The district of East Prince includes sixteen schools, viz: Albion Union, represented by Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Lefursey; Bedeque Methodist by Mr. and Mrs. Callbeck, Mr. and Mrs. Meysse, Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Wightman; Bedeque Baptist by Albert Schurman, Irene and Estella Schurman; Chelton Methodist by Mrs. S. Lowther, Mrs. Pierson, Miss Price; Cape Traverse Methodist by Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Muttart; North Carleton Methodist by Mr. and Mrs. David Lowther Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lowther, Ella Lowther, Mrs. Thos. Myers, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Myers; Tryon Methodist by Mr. and Mrs. B. Lea, Mrs. D. Bell; Tryon Baptist by Rev. and Mrs. Clark, Peter Howat W. B. Howatt.

After devotional exercises, minutes of last convention were read and adopted, also reports of secretary and treasurer. A committee of three was appointed to take into consideration the revision of the constitution in regard to the representation of schools (viz) William Callbeck, Rev. John Clark, Albert Schurman, to report to evening session. Rev. G. P. Raymond then explained the benefit derived from the publishing of the Interdenominational Reports, and the work of the Provincial Association in general. A nominating committee then reported the following as officers, President, Albert Schurman; Vice Pres., Jas. Morrison; Sect. and Treas. Hermas Myers (re-elected); additional executive committee Arnold Lefursey, W. S. Muttart. Moved seconded and carried that this report be adopted. Suitable remarks were given by the retiring President, Major Lowther. On suggestion by Rev. John Clark, Rev. G. P. Raymond was invited to a seat in the convention, which he replied to in a pleasing manner, and then gave an address on Normal Work impressing upon his hearers the necessity of abundant and systematic Bible study. The black-board lesson on the teacher's qualification was very interesting.

The evening session was very largely attended, the church being well filled. Two excellent papers were read by W. S. Muttart and Miss Jennie Leard. Rev. John Clark of Tryon then gave an excellent address on "The purpose of the Sunday School"—dealing with the three points, an educative power, a moral force and a means of the conversion of the young. The Field Secretary gave an address on the utility of the Home Department and explaining how to organize and conduct a new and helpful feature of Sunday School work. Rev. E. A. Wightman, Pastor of the Searletown and Bedeque Methodist Circuit expressed his appreciation of the several papers and addresses and moved a vote of thanks to the Field Secretary for his attendance and help at the sessions of convention. This was seconded and passed after which the meeting closed. All present expressed the opinion that this had been the best convention ever held by this district.
