## British Plan Not Supported Non-Intervention Committee Adjourns For Several Weeks Vacation.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—(CP-Havas)—Great Britain's compromise plan to put teeth in the "hands of Spain" agreement and accord belligerence recognition to the Spanish combatants after "substantial" withdrawal of foreigners failed to achieve unanimous support today at a long meeting of the Non-Intervention Sub-Committee. The group adjourned for several weeks vacation.

The Soviet Ambassador Ivan Masluyev, who had been expected to announce his government's recognition when he announced his refusal to consider such recognition until all foreigners fighting in Spain were repatriated.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6.—Parliamentary followers of the Conservative party who survived the Liberal deluge in the last election gathered in Ottawa tonight for a meeting which may mark a new milestone in the history of the party. Tomorrow the members meet in their caucus room at the House of Commons to learn whether their leader, Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, has determined to resign or to remain in the post he accepted 19 years ago.

Whatever Mr. Bennett's decision may be party organization and policy will also be discussed. With two years of the term of the present Liberal government elapsed Conservatives feel it is time to bestir themselves about preparations for the next election.

## Nationals Are Moved From War Regions

Hostilities Spread To Central  
China—Whole Of Country Will  
Be Involved Is Belief.

## Russia To Increase U. S. Purchases

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—A new trade agreement between the United States and Soviet Russia became effective today, pledging Russia to increase its yearly purchases of United States goods by at least 25 per cent.

The United States in return granted Russia unconditional most-favored-nation commercial treatment for the first time. The agreement went into force upon proclamation by President Roosevelt and simultaneous approval by the Soviet government.

## Insurgent Drive Has Been Stopped

Initiative Passes To Government  
Forces In Battle Area.

MADRID, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Insurgents' Teruel drive in northeastern Spain has been stopped, government commanders declared tonight, and the initiative has passed to the government in that battle area.

They said the Insurgents' recent thrust into Cuenca Province, advancing the southern limits of the long, narrow salient pointed at Valencia, collapsed because poor roads prevented the Insurgents from bringing up reinforcements as rapidly as could the government.

## Would Accept British Plan For Palestine

ZURICH, Switzerland, Aug. 6.—(CP-Havas)—Dr. Kurt Blumenfeld, head of the Progressive Zionists of Palestine, pleaded today for acceptance of the British plan to partition the Holy Land and create a separate Jewish state. He spoke during a session of the World Zionist Congress.

## Clipper Crosses Atlantic In 16 Hours, 2 Mins.

## Bankers Committee Will Study Bill
