Report Gives Optimistic Trade Picture For Canada

OTTAWA, Nov. 23 (OP)—Despite growing state monopolism in Eastern Europe, Canada is riding the post-war world's trade boat on a crest of unprecedented prosperity.

This and other significant features of Canada's post-war domestic and external trade highlight the Trade Department's annual report, made public today.

The 80-page document, covering the fiscal year ended March 31, 1949, mixes the prosperity report with a grim reminder that state monopolism and bilateralism, a thorn in the side of free trade, are continuing to flourish, especially in Eastern Europe.

On the bright side, the department says: 1. Production, employment and trade in 1948 exceeded the high levels of 1947.

2. "The investment boom continued unchecked." 3. The country made a recovery from the heavy debt trade balance in United States' favor.

4. Foreign industrialists showed renewed interest in establishing plants in Canada. About 500 sought information.

On the gloomy side: 1. There was a "growing tendency" by some countries, particularly in Eastern Europe, to eliminate private trade and to establish state monopolies.

2. Dollar shortages continued to hamper Canadian trade, not only with the United Kingdom, but with other Commonwealth and sterling countries.

3. When South Africa announced exchange and import controls last November, she became the last of the Commonwealth countries to leave the free-trade competitive ranks and new clamorings arose from Canadian exporters for Government help.

Canada's foreign trade, totalling \$5,750,000,000, reached a new high in 1948. Demand for Canadian goods mainly in the United States, increased Canadian exports.

Canadian gold and dollar reserves, which fell to a dangerous low of about \$470,000,000 in 1947, recovered in 1948, due to a \$636,000,000 reduction in the debt balance with the U.S.

This reduction was accompanied by an increase of 10 per cent in total trade between the two countries and to significant readjustment in the geographical pattern in Canadian foreign trade.

Exports to the U.S. touched a high of \$1,501,000,000, compared with \$1,034,000,000 in 1947; imports dropped from \$1,978,000,000 to \$1,805,000,000.

Improvement in the export position had more effect on the Canadian balance of payments than the more widely publicized import restrictions which were designed to curb United States dollar expenditures.

Imports from the U.S. dropped from \$1,978,000,000 in 1947 to \$1,805,000,000 in 1948, a reduction of \$163,000,000.

There will be no by-election in Ward One if Mayor B. Earle MacDonald follows a resolution passed at a special meeting of the City Council yesterday afternoon.

Coun. N. V. Lowther moved and Coun. Albin Farmer seconded asking unanimously by the Councillors, all of whom were present except Couns. J. D. Stewart and Edwin C. Johnston.

The resolution reads: "In view of the fact that the earliest possible date for the election in Ward One would precede the next general civic election by only two months, the Mayor be urged not to commit the City to the large and unjustifiable expense attending such a by-election."

The meeting was called to consider an application from Central Creameries Ltd. to purchase a plant site from the City in the Spring Park area.

Mr. James A. Fullerton, read a letter which had been received by the Council in September asking if the site could be purchased for expansion purposes and the manufacture of a "product not now in production in the Province."

The meeting was attended by Messrs. John A. and Percy M. Simmonds for Central Creameries.

A discussion arose regarding the disposal of the water. Mr. John Simmonds explained that the reason for disposing of the clean water from the condensers through the surface storm sewers at present was because a well had been drilled previously and the City had objected to carrying this sewage system.

Coun. C. M. Cox said it would seem inconsistent to have sold the site previously to an outside firm and refuse it to a local concern. However, he pointed out that the school might be interested in the site for the proposed new high school and the City might some day want it for a park-site in case of further expansion.

Coun. Farmer said he felt Central Creameries should get it "if possibly can," but was reluctant to give up the city site. Coun. Lowther also spoke.

Stating that the majority of the Council seems to be in favor of the sale, Coun. Wendell Benton suggested a resolution to that effect "pending the water department giving its OK, on the disposal of sewage." There was no seconder for this and Coun. Benton withdrew the suggestion.

The Mayor then committed the matter to the Public Property Committee with instructions to meet the School Board and discuss the sewage problem with the water department.

"You'll get a written answer within a week," he assured Messrs. Simmonds. The meeting was adjourned until a date to be fixed.
