It will be remembered that she went overseas during the war with the American Expeditionary Force being engaged in nursing. The family record in this area—struggle was a notable one, her five brothers at the same time serving in the war, two of them being killed and another injured for life. —Benny Gaudet, the ten year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gaudet, New Annan has mysteriously disappeared and his parents are very anxious to hear something of him. Five weeks ago last Saturday he went to visit his uncle, Mr. Cyrus Gaudet in Bedeque, where he stayed a week and shortly before the big snow storm he started to return home on the ice. It was not until sometime afterwards that his father learned of the boy starting home and then he began to make inquiries. He has heard of a boy corresponding to the description turning up at Albany and other places but investigations proved it was not the Gaudet boy. It is feared that he may have got caught in the storm and perished but there is a possibility that he may have gotten away safely and stopping at some farm house. The distraught parents are anxious to learn of some news of their boy and if anyone knows anything of his whereabouts they are requested to communicate with Mr. E. H. Raynor, Summerside at once.

—Mr. William Moran, principal of U. C. C., Charlottetown, was a passenger eastward on Tuesday morning from here.

—Mr. Matthew Richard, a returned hero, who still suffers from wounds received at the war, went this week to the Charlottetown Hospital where he will undergo an operation.

—Messrs. James Murphy and James McManus, two commercial men who arrived here a short time ago from Ireland, have started to work after a rest of a few days in town. Both men are chock full of the trouble now existing in Ireland.

DUBLIN, March 10—Eamonn de Valera, Sinn Fein leader, issued his long promised manifesto last evening, through the Sinn Fein publicity department.

The manifesto is signed by De Valera and almost all the other members of the Dail Eireann, including Arthur Griffith and several men at present in jail.

It takes the form of an address, adopted at the January meeting of the Dail Eireann to the representatives of foreign nations.

After reviewing at great length and from the Sinn Fein point of view the circumstances culminating in the declaration of an "Irish republic," the document declares that "this is a legitimate application of the principle of National Self-Determination. The manifesto is filled with the usual Sinn Fein charges against the British government, the crown forces and the Black and Tans.

It concludes in these terms: "We, the official spokesmen and the elected parliament of the Irish people, call upon mankind to witness that our people have been ready to welcome peace with England that has a just basis. No other basis of peace is possible. We have pledged ourselves and our people faithful to the cause until death. You representatives of sister nations cannot be insensible to the issue."

Spanish Premier Is Assassinated
 MADRID, Mar. 10—This city was horrified last night when it became known that Eduardo Dato, Premier and Minister of Marine had been assassinated while returning home from a late session of the Spanish Senate.

A motor cycle with side-car carrying two men followed the Premier's motor unnoticed there being many other similar machines on the streets. When the Premier's car reached the Plaza Independencia near Senor Dato's home, the motor cycle increased its speed and approached the side of the Minister's automobile. At that point the street is quite dark. When the motor cycle was drawn up even with the automobile the two men in the side-car and the driver of the machine opened fire upon the Premier.

The whole tragedy was enacted in a few moments and as the last shot rang out the motor cycle swung into a side street and vanished.

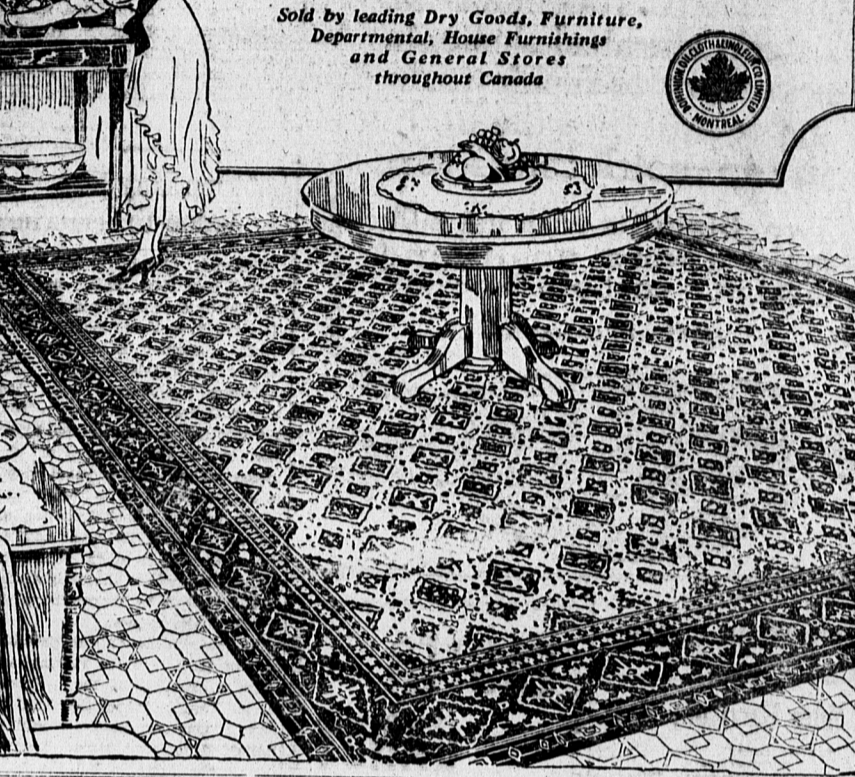

Railway Men Severely Shocked

OTTAWA, March 10.—Much consternation was caused in organized labor circles generally and in the railway branch of these in particular by the statement made in the House of Commons last evening by Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Railway, to the effect that the high cost of railway operation in Canada was hindering the development of the roads and Canada itself and the rider that the high wages being paid was responsible to an extent for this condition.

CHICAGO, Mar. 10—Information received at local headquarters of the railway labor department of American Federation of Labor indicates that virtually every large railroad in the United States is preparing to put wage reductions into effect for all their employees. B. M. Jewell, Chairman of the Committee, said in discussing the proposed reduction announced by Pennsylvania lines. An official of the association of the western railway executives who declined to be quoted, said Jewell's statement "probably was true" that "further wage reduction announcements might be expected at any time."

Hooper May Not Join White Sox

SACRAMENTO, CALIF., March 9.—Harry Hooper, outfielder of the Boston American League club, may not join the Chicago White Sox to whom he was traded last week in exchange for John Collins and Leibold, he told friends here yesterday.

Hooper was quoted as saying that he had expected to return to the Red Sox but he was not consulted as to the White Sox deal and therefore would demand a large salary from the Chicago club.
