CANADIANS ARE EAGER FOR FIGHT ON OPEN GROUND

LONDON, March 11.—One of the latest arrivals at Shorncliffe is Armitage Lawton, of Toronto, suffering from rheumatism and strain through falling while making for the trenches. Despite his injuries he did his forty-eight hours' trench duty along with the rest. In fact, it was some days later that his condition forced him to go sick. Speaking to the Canadian Associated Press representative today he described how his platoon went forward to the trenches. "We had the enemy's machine-guns on us from the first moment we moved forward towards the trenches," said Lawton. "We were advancing in the dark, but rockets kept going up. Then we used to fall flat. Just as I was getting into the trench it was necessary to repeat the falling down business. Unfortunately, I fell more than I bargained for. I had been moving right on the edge of the trench and I fell to the bottom. I was badly shaken up. However, there I had to stop and during the next forty-eight hours I fired away with the rest. "Our men happened to be lucky, for as far as I know not one of them was hit. The platoon next to us came off much worse. Three of them were warming themselves round a pall close to me when a shell came along and took the heads of two of them clean off. "The relief party which followed us in our trench had not been there above an hour when eighty of them were blown out, the trench having been undermined." Lawton added that he had been in four different hospitals before reaching Shorncliffe. He emphasized the fact that nobody at the front knew what was going on except in his own immediate neighborhood. "All our boys want is for the Germans to come out," was Lawton's comment when asked as to the spirit of the Canadian troops. Major George Higginbottom, of Toronto, who was operated on on Tuesday, is progressing slowly.

OUR EDITOR IN BERLIN AT LEAST SCENTS DANGER

Theodore Wolff, of the Tageblatt, Fully Appreciates Dardanelles Action's Effect. ITALY IS HIS CHIEF HOPE

Thinks Allies May Find Herself in the Position of Maid Who Prematurely Counted Her Chickens.

LONDON, March 11.—The Daily Chronicle says that Theodore Wolff, chief editor of the Berlin Tageblatt, continues to entertain an article in his paper dealing with the bombardment of the Dardanelles, from which the paper says it is clear that he is one of the few German journalists of prominence who appreciate the situation which the Allies progress in the Straits will create.

Dr. Wolff says he has no illusions about the intentions of the Allies in forcing the passage, and admits that, if they are successful, the results will be of tremendous import. "There is," he says, "first, an intention to create uneasiness in Constantinople, and strengthen the hands of the opponents of Enver and Talaat. This might force the Porte either to conclude a separate peace with the Allies or withdraw the army threatening the Suez Canal. The second object is to stiffen Roumania and Bulgaria against the central monarchy." Von Hindenburg's recent victory, and the evacuation of Bukovina have, according to Dr. Wolff taken the strength out of the movement led by the Roumania leaders, Take and Jomescu; but it requires little imagination that that Roumania and Bulgaria "will sing another solemn and ably a song of welcome," when the Allies' warships appear before their harbors in the Euxine.

It is Italy, however, which the Allies have mainly in view, Dr. Wolff says. "Months their agent has been at work whispering to Italy's ears and warning her that a power which declines to take a part in the conflict cannot expect any portion of the spoils. Italy seems to be Dr. Wolff's chief hope. The Italians are a nation he says, which reckons cruelly and coldly and it is just possible that the British politicians who are counting on its co-operation are in the position of the milkmaid in the fable who engaged too prematurely in counting her chickens.

Besides, adds Dr. Wolff, will not the possession of Constantinople be decided on European battlefields and not in the Dardanelles? He recognizes however, the danger, and reluctantly quotes from a leading Swiss journal which roundly declares that war is unavoidable if Italy is not squared. "The Trentino is not ceded a revolution is certain as well as war." Dr. Wolff takes a most serious view of the situation and disapproves of the optimism of his journalistic colleagues who smile at the news from the Near East and pool-pool the possibility of a "European" battlefields and not in the Dardanelles? QUESTIONED IN 1913

OTTAWA, March 11.—The validity of the powers conferred on the now defunct Dominion Trust Company by Act of the British Columbia Legislature was called in question in October, 1913, when the acts of the provincial legislature passed under the review of the Minister of Justice at Ottawa. In a memorandum on the subject brought down, Hon. C. J. Doherty referred to the fact that the Legislature had conferred upon this company borrowing powers and permission to receive money on deposit and to allow interest. He said that it was "open to very grave question whether the powers of a Dominion corporation can be enlarged by a local legislature." The minister said power to receive money on deposit and pay interest on it was open to question as referring to the subject of banking. Further consideration by the legislature was advised. The Minister of Justice at the time questioned the propriety of local legislation conferring on the Colonial Trust Company powers concerned with the subject of banking and suggested that banking transactions be excluded. In February, 1914, a message was received from Attorney General Bowser, of British Columbia, stating that the suggested change was being made in the Dominion Trust Legislation. Mr. Bowser also said that the Colonial Trust Act excluded banking privileges, but he suggested that the relation of deposits and interests to banking be left for the courts to pass upon.

U. S. PUTS A BAR ON CANADIAN POTATO

REPORTED TO HAVE FOUND POWDERY SCAB ON SHIPMENT FROM N. B.

OTTAWA, March 11.—United States inspectors have reported that they have found powdery scab in a shipment of potatoes from New Brunswick to Boston and have given notice to the Department of Agriculture that no Canadian potatoes will be permitted to enter the United States from Canada after tomorrow.

The potatoes complained of in Boston were immediately purchased for export from Boston and there was no difficulty, in so far as the quality was concerned with the country to which they were to be exported. The Department of Agriculture is investigating to ascertain if the statements made by the United States inspectors have any foundation.

The Minister of Agriculture in December last made an arrangement with the Department of Agriculture to be issued to shippers of Canadian potatoes allowing potatoes to enter the United States. This arrangement was to continue so long as there was no powdery scab found in any of the shipments.


