## Nearly Seventy Million Points Cast Miss Jennie Moase is Declared the Winner of the Gray Dort Hundreds of New Subscriptions Added to The Daily Guardian

LONDON, Aug. 29—Reports today from the revolutionary area of Malabar, British India, indicating that British troops and cavalry had arrived there tender to confirm the belief in London that the uprising would be confined to this area, although none here would deny the seriousness of the situation or its potentialities for spreading. ### Great Hopes For New Aerial Machine

LONDON, Aug. 29—Much is expected from the tests of Great Britain newly constructed helicopter vertically flying machine made at the Royal Aircraft Works at Farnborough by a new trust, extraordinary precautions are being taken to insure that no spy will gain the slightest inkling of the principles of construction, the place of the tests and the time they will occur are kept secret and it is not improbable that the tests may be made at dusk.

### Employment Trend Is Now Upward

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 29—Taking the Dominion as a whole the volume of employment now is about what it usually is in midwinter according to a bulletin to be issued by the employment service today. Since the beginning of April, says the bulletin the trend of employment has been upward with a few brief downward movements and in the first half of July the curve was mounting at a rate which if continued would have brought the volume of employment to the highest level reached during the present year. However, the curve has remained almost stationary, a volume of employment in the beginning of August about the same as in midwinter.

### Possible Delegates To Labor Congress

OTTAWA, Aug. 29—Canadian representatives at the labor conference to be held at Geneva in October under the auspices of the League of Nations have not yet been officially announced, it is confidently expected, however, that Senator G. D. Robertson, minister of labor will be one of the two delegates representing the government. Tom Moore, president of the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress will probably represent Canadian employees and S. R. Parsons Toronto, Canadian employers.

### Governor Patterson Died in Victoria

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 29—Hon. T. W. Patterson, Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia from 1909 to 1914, died here today after a long illness. He was born in Ayrshire, Scotland, seventy years ago, and during his early manhood lived in Oxford County. He came out west in 1885, identified with the Canadian Pacific Railway construction. His widow survives.

### No Preparation for G.T. Bond Payment

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 29—It is not expected here that anything will be done by the government in the direction of meeting the charge due on Grand Trunk Pacific bonds in London on Thursday. The policy of the government it was pointed out was that it would not accept any liability until the award of the arbitration board had been handed down. Payments on the debentures are two and a half in arrears it is stated at the finance department this morning. It was stated that no preparation had been made there for meeting Thursday morning's payment.

### U.M.W. to Work Port Hood Collieries
