ALBERTA GOVERNMENT TO DEVELOP SALT MINE

EDMONTON, Oct. 9.—Alberta's Farmer government has decided to develop a salt mine. Premier Greenfield has issued instructions for the operations to be started immediately in the extensive salt beds at Waterways near Fort McMurray. Tests conducted in previous years at McMurray proved the existence of salt deposits there and the field is believed to extend to waterways.

The provincial government's idea is to develop high salt workings within easy reach of the government owned railways, the A. and G. W. whose terminus is at Waterways.

The government has not yet decided whether it will market the salt itself or turn this part of work over to a private company.

METHODISTS ENTER HEATED DEBATE ON CHURCH UNION

TORONTO, Oct. 9.—By far the most interesting debate of the Methodist General Conference, since it opened in Toronto about ten days ago, was that on church union which occupied both sessions Friday, and which was precipitated by the presentation of the report of the Church Union committee. The first speaker to offer a criticism of the methods by which church union was being brought about was Rev. Dr. James Smythe, principal of the Wesleyan College, Montreal, who emphatically declared his opposition to amalgamation with the Presbyterian Church if that body was not unanimous on the question. "I would rather," he said, "have another vote taken on church union than draw into church union by the nose of the neck any part of my church against its will."

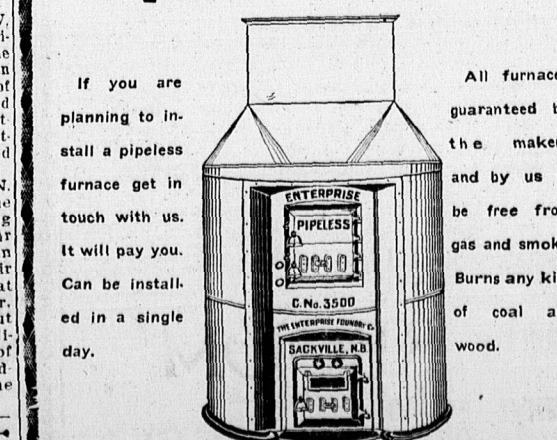
He was followed by a number of speakers who, while declaring their opposition to his attitude, complimented him upon his presentation of his view point. Among them were several delegates from Western Canada who avowed that if church union was consummated, there would be a new denomination in their part of the Dominion.

Union Defended

It was left for the Hon. N. W. Rowell, K. C., to reply to the criticisms levelled against the Church amalgamation, and when he had concluded, the report of the joint committee on law and legislation dealing with the United Church Act, which he presented earlier in the day, was adopted unanimously.

Rev. C. E. Crowell, Sydney, N. S., declared that the people of the Methodist Church were not being called upon to make any unfair sacrifices. The Presbyterians, in merging the identity of their churches were making equally great sacrifices. He admitted, however, that there had been delay, but held that there was a wider readiness than anxiety. The cause of the delay was largely the consideration of the legal side of the proposed United Church Act.
