The St. John Star says: It is understood that E. A. Powell, K. C. ex-M. P., who is now practicing in Sackville, will shortly move to St. John and permanently locate here. Mr. Powell is considered one of the leading barristers of the province, an energetic worker for his party, and his removal to St. John will prove an important addition to both legal and political circles.

SATURDAY was Prohibition Day at the Police Court and distinct prestige was added to the prosecutions by the presence of F. L. Hazard, K. C., who was retained to conduct the cases on behalf of Inspector Jenkins. The three liquor men who had been summoned to appear were Charles D. Collings for third offence, Andrew Murphy for second offence and Roderick McNeill for first. In the Collings case which was watched by J. J. Johnston for the defendant a conviction was obtained and Collings was sentenced to six months imprisonment in the Jail. In the case against Andrew Murphy, a witness named Robert Lund could not be found for service of a subpoena and the case was adjourned, for the purpose of finding the missing man. The third case was against Roderick McNeill who is a servant working around the stables at H. C. Connolly's. Several witnesses had gone into Connolly's bar which was kept by one John Horne and in answer to inquiries for liquor were told to go to the stable and ask McNeill for it. One witness when he approached McNeill and gave him the money for a flask was told to stand in the rear of the stable while McNeill disappeared and returned a few minutes later with the desired flask. The prosecution argued strongly for a conviction contending that McNeill was acting as the agent of Horne and undoubtedly got the liquor at the bar. The case was argued at length strongly by Mr. Hazard who pressed for a conviction. Weeks and Whear represented the defendant and Mr. Whear contended that no case had been made out. Judgment was reserved till next Saturday.
