To the ice-bound east comes cheering
news from an Islander who reads The
Guardian in far-off Vancouver. The City
Engineer there has ordered out the street
sprinkler, the spring flowers are out, the
rees are in leaf while the boys have been
playing marbles on the streets ever since
Christmas and watching the birds build
their nests. Happy Vancouver. Here
we are still in the ice, but living in
hopes. As saith the poet:

Under the ice the waters run,
Under the ice our spirits lie;
The genial warmth of the vernal sun
Will melt our fetters by and by.

The British Board of Trade returns for
January and February show that trade
between Britain and Canada is increasing
in a gratifying manner. The imports from
Canada during the two months show in-
creases over the corresponding period last
year of \$3,495,000 in the items of what
flour, bacon, cheese, oats, cattle, lambs,
eggs, hams, lumber and canned salmon.
There were some decreases in peas, butter,
lobsters and square timber. British ex-
ports to Canada during the same period
show increases of \$745,000 in 14 lines, the
only decreases noted being small in num-
ber and amount.

It is rather noteworthy that a crisis
should be pending in the Italian ministry
because of the illness of nearly all its
members. Sig. Prinetti, the capable
Minister of Foreign Affairs, and the
principal supporter of the Minister of the
Interior, Giolitti, was stricken with par-
alysis, while he was in conference with the
King, and his condition remains such as
to render it imperative to retire from
public life for a considerable time to come.
Sig. di Broglio, the Minister of the
Treasury, likewise is on the sick list,
while Sig. Balanzano has been suffering
for some weeks past from a complication
of influenza and gout. Sig. Carcano, the
Minister of Finance; Sig. Giolitti, and the
Premier, Zanardelli, also are ill and un-
able to fulfill the duties of their offices,
the Prime Minister's condition being ex-
ceptionally serious by reason of his ad-
vanced years.

It is regrettable to find going the rounds
of the press a reading notice which pur-
ports to be an extract from the London
Lancet in favor of the cigarette as the least
injurious form of using tobacco. The notice
in question is from "Liqueurs et Tabacs"
a French newspaper organ of the liquor
and tobacco trades. The fact of the clipping
appearing in a journal of that class
would naturally raise a prejudice against
it whether or not The Lancet ever pub-
lished it.

The Manitoba Free Press tells of a
wonderful colony of snakes in Northern
Assiniboia, in the valley where Snake

ed to be moving, so thick were the crawling

Congress has at last taken decisive ac-

licenses, and for those members of Parlia-

abundant opportunities to procure what
they want without carrying the traffic
into the building where our laws are
made.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL. ABOUT COLD STORAGE.

SIR,—Cold storage for storing perishable
goods such as fresh meats for shipping
would be worthless, because all kinds of
fresh meats when kept in mechanical
cold storage and then taken out and put
in another kind of cold storage, such as
ice because of the difference in tempera-
ture, causes dampness on the meat and it
will turn nasty in a very short time. The
only way cold storage would be profitable
is to have steamers calling here fitted
with the latest improved mechanical cold
storage and have it arranged so all kinds
of meats could be hung up with an air
space between each carcass. Poultry
would require to be packed in boxes with
an air space between each tier. All kinds
of meat ought to be hung in a dry, airy
place one day before being shipped. Meats
require the temperature to be at freezing
point.

In this way of shipping meats would
only be killed a few days until put on the
market, if this was arranged satisfactorily
I do not think the S. S. Manchester
Trader would have left this port empty
and draw a large subsidy for cold storage.

DEATH OF REV. ADAM GUNN.

Seldom has the news of a death come
with a greater shock or caused more uni-
versal sorrow in a community than did the
tidings of the sudden decease of the Rev.
Mr. Gunn in the distant North West on
Sunday morning the first day of March.

Mr. Gunn had conducted his usual ser-
vices on the previous Sabbath, led the En-
deavor Monday evening, attended a busi-
ness meeting of the managers Wednesday,
visited Thursday and Friday. Friday
evening he was taken suddenly ill and
though two physicians were summoned
and everything done that love and medi-
cal skill could do he passed peacefully
away twenty four hours afterwards.

Mr. Gunn was born in East River, St.
Mary's, Pictou County, Nova Scotia in
1846.

He first attended Pictou Academy and
then entered Dalhousie College where
he took his B. A. He then took two years
in theology in the Presbyterian College
Halifax, after which he went to Edin-
burgh where he completed his course by a
year's theology in the Free Church
college.

His first charge was at Gore and Kennel-
cooke N. S. where he spent fifteen years
in faithful service, beloved by his people.
In the year 1883 while in this charge he
was united in marriage to Miss Susie
McLellan. The union proved a particular-
ly happy one, the young wife proving a
true and fitting helpmeet to her devoted
husband.

Leaving Nova Scotia in response to a
call from the Cardigan people he found
the congregation burdened with debt and
in a far from prosperous condition. Mr.
Gunn took hold of the work as a call
from God and labored faithfully. He soon
had the joy of seeing one of the many re-
wards of his labor—the debt lifted, the
people united.

After twelve years service in Cardigan
Mr. Gunn took a three month's vacation
and went on a trip to the North West.
In a short time he won the hearts of the
people there and the Estevan-Portal
congregations gave him a unanimous call.
This he accepted and his induction was
fixed for the 10th day of March, the day
on which his body was laid to rest in the
Cardigan Cemetery amid the tears of his
sorrowing people.

A loving wife, two sons and four
daughters are left in his home to mourn
his loss.

THE ABEGWEITS

WERE DEFEATED

The Swiftest game Played
During this Season

Score 4 to 3—The Islanders Set a
Fast Pace But the Blue and
Red Boys Were Worthy
Foemen.

The Sydney Post thus describes the
Abegweits' first game in Sydney.

In one of the swiftest and best games of
hockey witnessed this season the S. A. A.
A. defeated the Abegweits of Charlotte-
town at the Rosslyn rink last evening by
a score of 4 to 3. The game comprised one
series of swift skating and brilliant
dashes with splendid stops made by the
goals of the respective teams particularly
by Moran of the Abegweits.

The S. A. A. A. never played a swift-
er and a steadier game, they were never in
batter form, and each member of the team
excelled in hard conscientious work.

The Abegweits set a fast pace in the
opening and continued it right through
till the finish. They are as swift a winged
seven as ever appeared on the ice in
Sydney; but they found foemen worthy
of their steel in the boys of the red and
blue.

The game was fought with both teams
bringing every pound of energy at their
command to bear upon their work: it
was exciting and the greatest enthusiasm
prevailed among the thousand spectators
present to witness the game.

The puck was never idle, no sooner did
it reach one end than it swiftly fled to
the other and back again. Shot after shot
was fired at the goalkeepers, but they
were invariably warded off. Each team
displayed brilliant work, and showed
themselves to be adepts at handling the
stick.

Twenty-three minutes of this fast work
had gone by before there was a score and
then Wiley "Wally" Pickard made a drive
for the net and drew first blood. S. A. A.
A. 1. Abegweits 0.

Two minutes later Hearn scored from
the right wing after a brilliant dash in
which he took the disc clear from front of
S. A. A. A. goal. S. A. A. A. 2. Abeg-
weits 0.

The score stood at these figures until
the end of the half.

Half a minute after the opening Phalen
made a score by shooting from the left
wing. S. A. A. A. 3. Abegweits 0.

Fast and furious hockey followed. The
S. A. A. A. combined to bring the puck
up ending with "Wally" making another
score. S. A. A. A. 4. Abegweits 0.

The scene then changed and in the
short space of a minute and a half the
Abegweits made three goals—two by
Williams and one by Brown. Each had a
clear shot of ice before him and it was
impossible to prevent his scoring. There
was no more scoring during the half, the
figures standing at the ringing of the bell
4 to 3.

Roy C. McLean refereed the game and
gave every satisfaction.

EXAMPLES FOR OUR COLLEGES.

ITHACA, N. Y., March 10.—Announce-
ment was made today of a scheme for the
pensioning of Cornell University profes-
sors, who, in accordance with the rule
adopted by the board of trustees last fall,
will be retired after attaining the age of
seventy years. One hundred and fifty thou-
sand dollars has been given the university
for this purpose, and this amount will be
placed at compound interest until it will
amount to \$250,000. Each professor retired
will receive an annual pension of \$1,500.
