**HOG PRODUCTION**—The Department of Agriculture informs the Guardian that a great many orders are being received for breeding sows, particularly since the importation of the Ontario lot. The demand for these hogs has emphasized the fact that there are many farmers in the Province who find, when the opportunity is thus offered, that it is possible to maintain an extra sow and her litter, not only for the sake of extra profit but for that of patriotically adding to the bacon production of the province. The demand for these hogs shows the necessity of immediately applying as the number still available is rapidly decreasing.

**GOOD EXAMPLE**—The young Ladies Philanthropic Class of the Baptist Sunday School here, cultivated a small plot of ground on Orlebar St. last summer from which they derived a vast amount of healthy exercise and experience. Probably much better results would have been secured by a more constant stirring up of the soil, but this class could work only after six o'clock in the evening. Besides improving the appearance of the street, they raised eight bushels of potatoes, one bushel of tomatoes several pounds of seed beans and peas and eight pounds of Haszard's Improved turnip seed which has recently given returns of 92 per cent under the government test at the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. At a time like this when every pound of food counts, the example set by this class of young ladies, all of them busy otherwise, might well be followed by others. A little general effort on the part of those who can spare time from other less profitable enjoyment would do very much to relieve the situation. This class will be well worth watching next summer.

**Constantine Giving Venizelos Trouble**  
 LONDON, Feb. 11.—According to Reuter's Athens correspondent former King Constantine is continuing his open hostility toward the present Greek government. It has been discovered that his propaganda extended to expatriated Greeks, a recruiting campaign being carried out in Constantinople, among Greek officers residing here. Some of these soldiers have appeared on the Macedonian front.  
 Sofia and Constantinople advices are to the effect that renitances agreed upon when he abdicated the throne have not reached Constantine for some time, owing to his hostility to the Greek government.  
 Former King Constantine of Greece is now in Switzerland, according to latest advices.

**THE CAREER OF ABDUL HAMID**  
 (Special to the Guardian)  
 LONDON, Feb. 12.—The late Sultan of Turkey gained ascendancy under circumstances nearly as tragic as those which ended his career. Born Sept. 22, 1848, the second son of Sultan Abdul Mejid, he became sovereign when his elder brother, Murad V., was deposed because of mental incapacity, in 1876. It was a time when Turkey was in a state of extreme depression almost succumbing to the tremendous blows of Russia. Out of this slough the new Sultan saved the remnants of Turkish prestige. Many critics give him credit for a successful regime; others denounce it as infamous. Whatever the true estimate, it is a fact that the Turkish empire increased its power; schools were reformed; the army built up; commerce extended and parliamentarism created under Abdul Hamid.  
 Stubbornly though he had fought outside forces to prevent disintegration of his Empire, his fall came with

in the Empire itself by the rise of the Young Turks, a party bent upon constitutional government. Abdul Hamid granted a constitution but failed to carry out the liberal ideas of the generation. In the revolution of 1909, he was driven from the Imperial palace on the shores of the Bosphorus, made a prisoner, and confined in the villa Latini, a former residence of a Greek merchant in Saloniki, the city where the Young Turk movement had its birth.
