Depopulating Island

(Ottawa Journal)

The recent removal of the entire population of St. Kilda's Island to the mainland of Scotland, to avoid starvation, recalls a similar movement undertaken five years ago by the Scottish Immigrant Aid Society, by agreement with the Canadian Department of Immigration and Colonization, when a large number of Hebridean families were established on productive farms in Northern Alberta. Indian lands purchased by the Dominion Government were divided into about fifty units, buildings were erected and the semi-ready farms sold to the settlers at cost, from \$1,000 upwards.

These fishermen and crofters had experienced great hardships in striving to great a bare living from the sea, and from their bleak and near barren lands and it was a merciful act to transport them to the more genial climate of Alberta. Yet in the breasts of some of the older migrants there was a sense of a great loss; however forbidding these humble habitations were they were still "home." They expressed regret at having to break the old ties and begin life anew in a distant country, but they realized that there were great opportunities for the younger generation and that the removal was to their advantage.

On the whole the transplanting of the Hebridean people was a successful experiment. They are good workers, satisfied with the pioneer conditions of the north and are making good progress on the land. The new Government has put the ban temporarily on assisted immigration, while employment conditions are as they are, but when the situation rights itself and Canada is again in a position to offer homes to Brit sheers the extension of the movement, of opening the unused lands for the use of settlers of the type of the Scottish crofters might well be considered.
