EGG CIRCLE MEETING.—The annual meeting of Central Bedeque Egg Circle was held on Monday, 15th inst. the president Mr. D. B. McDonald presiding. This circle has had a considerable increase in membership during the past year. Eggs to the number of 26,779 dozens, were collected with a value of \$7,072.57 during 1925. A vote of thanks was tendered the manager, Mr. A. W. Schurman for the faithful and energetic performance of his duty. It was resolved, unanimously, that delegates from this circle, bring in a resolution, at the central convention in Charlottetown, requesting that the present law protecting skunks be repealed and that a bounty be placed on these obnoxious and destructive animals. Jenkins and J. H. MacDonald were appointed delegates to the Central Convention. The directors for the ensuing year are as follows: D. B. McDonald, president; L. A. Schurman, vice president; T. J. Inman, secretary; Edwin Lord, Duncan Nicholson, Artemas McCaull, Horace Wright, Alex. B. MacFarlane and J. H. MacFarlane.

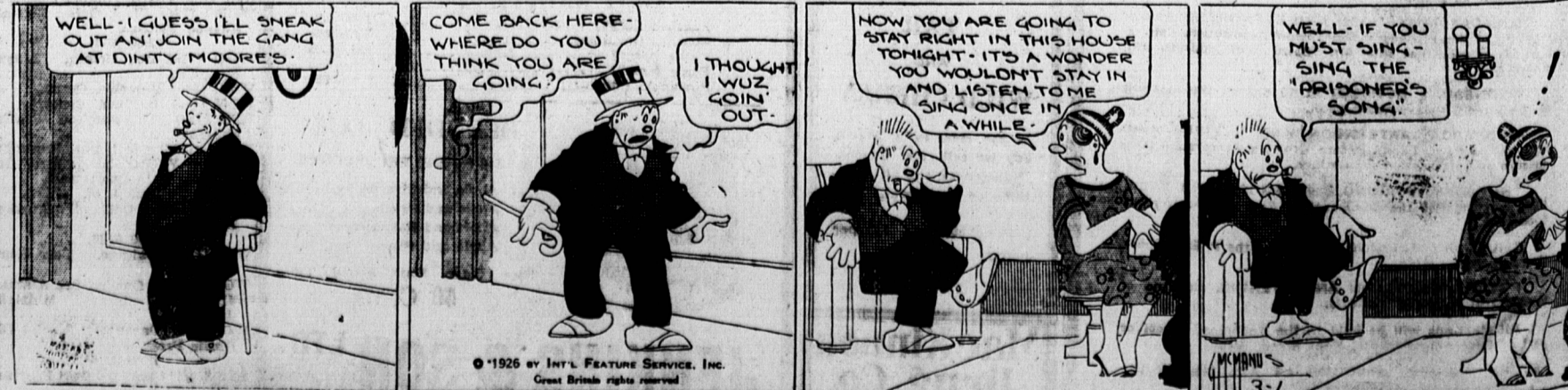
