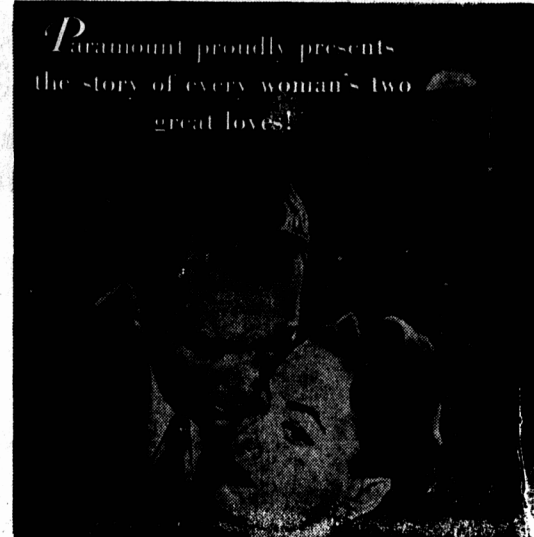

aid the flow had reached halfway, about four miles, down all sides. Mayon's almost-perfect cone, towering 8,274 feet above the sea "remained intact, with the lava rolling down from fissures on all sides.

Always Violent. Mayon, also known as Mount Ibaay, has been violent throughout recorded history. In 1928 it put on a remarkable show, puffing up gases which exceeded 10 miles in the air. In the 19th century there were 28 recorded eruptions, including one in 1814 which destroyed several surrounding towns.

Tunnel Drying. Another innovation officials of the Dominion Fisheries Department has in mind is a "tunnel" drying of cod and hake. This modern method is said to be much quicker and much more effective in removing moisture from the fish.

After having been split and subjected to immersion in brine for a specified time, the fish are removed and placed in the "tunnels" where they are subjected to hot air which flows through at a high velocity. It is said that fish receiving this treatment can be shipped to Cuba or other tropical or sub-tropical climates with less danger of spoiling in transit than fish treated by the old method of sun drying.

Local fishery officials say the introduction of the "tunnel" system of curing fish, to this Province is not being considered at present, because Island fishermen do not "go in" for cod and hake fishing on a scale large enough to justify the installation of such equipment.
