A communication was read from the Water and Sewer Commissioners asking for the issue of debentures for \$1000. It was decided that the Mayor should sign an order upon presentation of certificate by the Commissioners.

A delegation composed of Rev. T. F. Fullerton, Major Stewart, D. Nicholson, Geo. E. Hughes, Jas. Paton, F. H. Beer, Geo. Moore, J. A. McDonald, were heard in reference to the granting of \$100 for the South African Contingent. The amount was granted.

An application for repairs to the keeper's house in Victoria Park was referred to the Public Property Committee.

A letter was read from Mr. John Gillis complaining about the destruction of a tree in front of his house on Fitzroy Street. It was pointed out that Mr. Gillis had placed the tree at great expense and it was considered an outrage. Upon motion the city surveyor was instructed to take action against the company causing the destruction.

Mr. John F. Wheat then read the blank contract for street lighting which was finally adopted, the contract calling for the lighting of the streets for five years at the rate of \$69.50 per lamp.

The increased rates, monopoly, etc, were freely discussed.

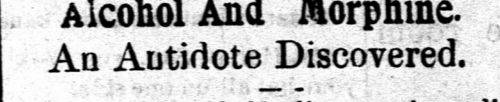
