Cadet Wins MacDonald's Briar Match

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES
South March, Ontario, August 14.—Curly-headed Gentleman Cadet R. D. McLeod, 20-year-old Saint John rifleman, today shot his way to the top of the MacDonald's Briar Match, one of the richest events at the annual meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

The Maritime cadet, protégé of Lieut. J. Neal Dow, Saint John cadet coach and Blesley shot, sniped a possible 50 over 300 yards and added 49 at 630 for 99 of a possible century and led more than 400 of Canada's sharpshooters. Cadet of Royal Military College, Kingston, the youth last year realized an ambition when he travelled to Blesley as a member of the Canadian team. He failed, however, to gain a berth on this year's team.

The keen eye-sight of the Cadet triumphed over a shimmering mirage and a hot sun that beat down over the ranges and cut down the scores. He had no trouble sending his 10 rounds away at the short range, tagged for the bulls-eye and at the longer stage appeared to be headed for a double possible, but his fourth shot was an inner. Reloading, he sent his remaining six rounds into the black. Five riflemen turned in scores of 98, 16 had 97 and nearly a score 96.

Events of the second was the outcome of a new pair of glasses. Twenty years he had been seeking a major prize award here but was never successful. Finally he bought a new pair of glasses which bore results today. The Toronto riflemen dropped only one shot on each range.

Among those carding scores of 97 was Lieut. Dow, Saint John, The Life-Members Match, fired over 1,000 yards, the longest range yet in a Maritime, Pte. E. H. Gladwin of Halifax winning with the 49, one short of possible. His exhibition of planting all but one shot in the bulls-eye was praised highly, considering the mirage across the targets.

Two Ontario marksmen, Sergt. N. L. Beckwith of Hamilton, and Lieut. Dick Storrer of Toronto, and three Westerners, Lieut. Stephen Johnson of Wayne, Ala., Major W. H. Mayhew of Edmonton, and Tvt. J. D. Doney of Penhold, Alta., tied for second, one point behind the winner.

Riflemen retired early tonight, preparing for the qualifying stage of the Governor-Generals' match over 200, 500 and 600 yards. The highest 150 go into the final stage Saturday. Last year the Gold Medal was won by Sergt. Jack Ward of Sunny Brae, N.B.

Semi-finals in all divisions will be played tomorrow morning and driving, putting and approaching competitions in the afternoon. The finals of the meet will be held Friday with 36 holes constituting the championship round.

Professionals will hold a 36-hole medal play championship Friday for the Association purse. At least 10 pros will be competing.

Giants And Cards Split Twin Bill

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—St. Louis Cardinals and New York Giants packed the Polo Grounds with thrills and people today, but after 4 1/2 hours of battle they wound up exactly where they started. The Giants won the first game of the doubleheader 6-4, the Cards the second 3-0, and the world champions were no better off than when they started the "crucial" five game series, three full games behind the New York League leaders.

Boston Braves, deeply entrenched in the National League cellar, celebrated their homecoming today by winning one of their few doubleheaders of the season, defeating Cincinnati Reds 8-1 and 11-5.

The fallenders played errorless baseball in both games and used their bats to better advantage than they had for a week. Pittsburgh Pirates won both ends of a doubleheader from the Phillies at Philadelphia, taking the first 8-1 and the second 7-4.

In the opener the Pirates hit Curt Davis and Hugh Mulcahy for 13 safeties, including a home run by Bud Hafey, while Bill Swift scattered nine hits through the Phillies ranks.

In the nightcap Sybil Johnson held a 4-2 lead until the eighth, when he was taken out because of the heat, and the Bucs hammered three of his successors for four runs before the inning ended. Brooklyn Dodgers bowled over Chicago Cubs in both ends of a doubleheader, 9-5 and 3-2 at Brooklyn.

Watson Clark's fine relief hurling and a couple of late assaults on Larry French and Charley Root settled the first game. After the Cubs had tied the nightcap twice, Brooklyn went ahead in the seventh on Joe Stepp's singles, a fielder's choice, a bunt and a fly.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—New York Yankees failed to overcome the combined jinx of Mel Harder's flinging and Lefty Gomez's inability to work as a relief hurler and the Indians pulled out a 7-6 victory in the ninth inning at Cleveland.
