ANNUAL MEETING CENTRAL SEED FAIR
The Annual meeting of the Committee appointed to manage the Central Seed Fair was held in Prince of Wales College on Tuesday May 2nd, at 11 o'clock. The following were present:
Rev. P. D. McGuigan, Messrs Simpson, J. A. O'Keefe, Brodie, O'Donnell, Devereaux, Noy, Lund, Cairns, Wood, Robert Drake and Wm. Drake, Mrs. Gill and Miss Howard.
The President called the meeting to order and made a few remarks. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. Mr. O'Keefe made some remarks regarding the Fair and stated that this was the time for suggestions and criticisms. Mr. Cairns considered that it would be better to give only three prizes in each class and to spend the money saved in this way to increase each prize. Peter Brodie thought that each prize should be increased and that instead of making fewer prizes for each section, the number should be increased to at least ten. Wm. Drake and others agreed to the extension of the prizes. Mr. O'Keefe and Mr. Simpson thought it was wise to extend the number of prizes unless more money could be had. He thought, however, that the Central Seed Fair should receive the same grant as the Provincial Seed Fair, at Summerside receives. After considerable discussion Mr. Brodie moved, seconded by Mr. H. McDonald, that Class A be carried out to ten prizes in each section and that the first prize for section 1 1/2 inclusive be \$3.00 and its 10th, prize \$0.50 cents. The remainder of class A should remain as it is except that it should all be carried out to ten prizes and the 10th prize in each section be 50c. After considerable discussion the motion carried 9-3.
Peter Brodie then moved, seconded by Pope Cook a resolution asking that each section in Class B be extended to ten prizes, after considerable discussion the motion, carried 6-4. In Class C, Mr. Vessey moved and Mr.

Wood seconded that the prize be offered for barley sheaf, and Mr. O'Keefe proposed that entries should be made for Section 9 as in other sections, both of these carried unanimously.
Considerable discussion took place regarding the sheaf. Some thought that it should be a sheaf direct from the "Binder, nothing however, was decided. It was unanimously decided to offer some special prizes for persons who had never exhibited before.
It was then agreed that the Household Science Department should be extended and that the prize list should be similar to that offered in 1913, with a special class made for new beginners.
Considerable discussion then took place over rules and regulations, after which the general Committee of Management was appointed.
Rev. P. D. McGuigan, President of the Committee, resigned and would not permit his name to go up again for re-election, James Simpson, Bayview was there upon appointed President. J. A. O'Keefe, W. P. Drake, and Wm. Drake were appointed directors and the remaining Board elected embled after which the meeting adjourned, to the call of the President.
