The following are the City market prices:—Ducks per pair one dollar to one twenty five, chickens per pair seventy five to one dollar, pork per lb eight and a quarter to eight and seven eighths, turkey per pound sixteen to eighteen, geese one dollar to one twenty five each, hay pressed per ton eight dollars to eight fifty, straw pressed per ton five dollars, hay loose per cwt forty to fifty cents and straw loose per cwt twenty five to thirty cents, butter per lb twenty two to twenty three cents, white oats per bus. forty six to forty eight and black oats forty six to fifty cents per bus.
