Roosevelt In Review Of War Events

WASHINGTON, July 28—(AP)—President Roosevelt declared tonight that "the first crack in the Axis has come," and added that the United Nations will not settle the conflict for "less than total victory."

The President, in an analysis of the war broadcast to the American people, promised that Mussolini and "his Fascist gang" would be "brought to book and punished for their crimes against humanity." He said "no criminal will be allowed to escape by the expedient of resignation."

Post-World

Looking ahead toward the post-war world, the President said the United Nations are substantially agreed on general objectives but are not yet agreed that the time has not yet arrived for an international discussion of all the terms of peace and all the details of the future.

18 Missing After Dredge Is Lost

Rev. Dr. Murphy Appointed To Kinkora Parish

He Is Succeeded By Rev. R. V. MacKenzie As Rector Of St. Dunstan's University.

The Bishop of Charlottetown has announced the appointment of Rev. Dr. J. A. Murphy to succeed the late Rev. Dr. Smith as pastor of Kinkora parish, and the appointment of Rev. R. V. MacKenzie, M.A., to the rectorship of St. Dunstan's University, with Rev. J. A. Sullivan, M.A., as Vice-Rector of the same institution.

Rev. Dr. Murphy has played a distinguished role in the educational life of Prince Edward Island. A native of Hope River, he taught school for some years before his graduation from St. Dunstan's University in 1910. He then taught in Prince of Wales College for 6 years after which he entered St. Augustine Seminary, Toronto. He was ordained in 1919 and after two years' school teaching entered St. Dunstan's University, where he took his degree in 1925.

He was then assigned as professor of St. Dunstan's University, and for the past six years has held the responsible position of Vice-Rector.

Ralston In Great Britain

LONDON, July 28—(CP Cable)—Col. J.L. Ralston, Canada's defence minister, heard a first-hand report today of the fighting in Sicily from the chief of the Canadian general staff, Lt.-Gen. Kenneth Stuart, who recently visited the battle area.

Col. Ralston's arrival by plane from Canada was announced today. The minister went into conference in a downtown London hotel room with Gen. Stuart. He said he expected to see the press "soon."

Nazis Report Rommel In Greece

LONDON, July 28—(Thurs- day)—(CP)—A German radio report said early today that the former Axis African commander, Field Marshal Erwin Rommel, is in Greece, the position following the fall of Mussolini, largely garrisoned by Italian troops.

Fierce Allied Air Offensive Continues

LONDON, July 28—(AP)—United States four-engine bombers penetrated deeper into Germany than ever before today to shatter an airplane factory at Oescherleben, only 80 miles southwest of Berlin, after R.A.F. and R.C.A.F. night fighters had cast the greatest bomb load in history on the tortured submarine centre of Hamburg in the sixth allied raid there in three days.

Clashes With Nazi Soldiers Are Reported

LONDON, July 28—(AP)—Violent fighting has broken out between Italian and German troops in Northern Italy according to reports seeping out of the war weary land of fallen Fascism, where grave disorders bordering on outright revolution were said to be sweeping Milan.

Accounts reaching Madrid said active Italian military resistance in the north at Milan and Turin was blocking a German attempt to pour 10 divisions into a line along the Po River, where the Germans were believed to have established a defence system in betrayal of a pledge to Marshal Badoglio to help hold all Italy.
