## IRELAND ANXIOUSLY AWAITS NEW LAND PURCHASE BILL

Though the criticisms which have been published on the land conference proposals disclose acute differences of opinion as to the interpretation of the provision as to payments by the tenants, one thing is abundantly clear, namely, that the country as a whole stands by the conference report, and hopes to see it used as the basis of a forthcoming Land Bill. The resolutions of representative bodies and of public meetings throughout the country give overwhelming evidence of this. The Supreme Governing Council—the National Directory—of the United Irish League, has deliberately adopted this view, and on the same day the Irish Parliamentary party unanimously endorsed it. In no quarter has the forecast given last week been accepted as the basis of a satisfactory settlement; and so far as the Nationalist party and the tenantry are concerned, it has been met by two declarations strongly and unitedly made, first, that any proposal for the purchasers to pay twenty-five years purchase, either of first or second rentals, will not be tolerated; and, second, that there is an absolute necessity for a treasury grant. 'Bonus there must be,' writes Mr. T. W. Russell, M. P., 'if we are to see an end of the desolating strife which has cursed the land for centuries.' The Freeman's Journal published a few days ago six columns of letters and seven columns of speeches and resolutions dealing with the matter, but with so many conflicting views as to the actual working of the scheme, it is not to be wondered at that the tenantry as a rule refrain from detailed analysis, and rely upon the judgment of the Parliamentary party. One strong reason for this attitude is, of course, the fact that within a brief period the conference scheme will be absolutely superseded by the Government Bill, and when the Government Bill is produced, the tenantry know that it will be submitted for discussion—and for consequent approval or rejection—to a convention at which their own trusted local delegates will be entitled to speak and vote.

#### CRITICAL BUT HOPEFUL.

Notwithstanding the weighty and unsparring criticisms by Mr. Walsh, the Catholic Archbishop of Dublin, Mr. Michael Davitt, and others whom the people trust, the prevailing tone is still one of hope and confidence. That the recent remarkable speeches of the Lord Lieutenant and Sir Anthony MacDonnell

have had something to do with this is undoubtedly due to the speeches during the past few months of the leaders of the Irish party, and in some degree to the vague rumors prevalent at one time of the appointment of Sir Anthony MacDonnell. A few days ago Mr. William O'Brien, in a letter to the Swinford District Council, referred to Mr. Wyndham's promise on which the land conference was founded. There are many who believe that that indicates a promise made privately to those who organized and carried out the conference. It is more likely, on the other hand, to refer only to the statement made by the Chief Secretary when in September last he startled the Irish people by the declaration that "no Government can settle the Irish land question—it must be settled by the parties interested." What follows seems to imply a promise. "The extent of useful action on the part of any Government," wrote Mr. Wyndham, "is limited to providing facilities, in so far as that may be possible, for giving effect to any settlement arrived at by the parties." The position of the Irish people is this: They submit the land conference report as the 'settlement,' and they await from the Government the necessary facilities.

#### WHAT DISAPPOINTMENT WOULD MEAN.

Should they be disappointed, the results cannot fail to be serious. Captain Shaw-Taylor predicts as a certainty 'a fierce renewal of the Irish land war.' Mr. T. W. Russell declares that it will throw Ireland back into despair, and worse, while the Irish Nationalist leaders generally assert that a land struggle more fierce and more determined than ever would be at once begun. Mr. Lindsay Talbot-Crosbie, a prominent Unionist landlord, on the other hand, hints at a recasting of political forces as a result of such a disappointment. 'The system of Party Government,' he writes, 'has not so utterly broken down that there is no alternative administration possible, and this may be brought about with the consequent accomplishment of our object in far less time than is thought a finish would involve. The Imperial Government,' he adds, 'will have to learn that with Irishmen Irish interests are to be the first concern, and that no British Government will be able to count upon Irish support while these are disregarded. It is no wonder that Mr. Redmond, in his whip to the Irish members, declares that the coming session 'will be fraught with the gravest consequences to Ireland.'

### LIFE ON WINTER STEAMERS.

not to enter the water, as night was coming on and we didn't know what would happen if we did. We, therefore, made arrangements to spend the night on the ice. We turned our boats upside down and placed the masts and passengers underneath. A short time after doing this the ice parted about ten yards from where the boats were pulled up. The boats were then turned over and the passengers got in. In the darkness we went forward about 300 yards, when we again decided to halt and encamp for the night. It began to get very cold, and not having any fuel or provisions, it was decided that to get the former, a boat should be broken up. The only instrument with which this could be done was an axe, as we had no axes or hammers. The process was a slow one, as the outside of the boat was sheathed with tin. After it had been broken up a fire was built, but it rather made things uncomfortable, as the wet wood created a lot of smoke. The cold became so intense that some of the crew were obliged to walk about all night to keep from freezing to death. The next day land was not sighted until four o'clock in the afternoon. At that hour many of the men had their hands and feet badly frozen as a result of rowing and pulling the boats. Thursday night happened to be moonlight, and so the weary plodding onwards over the ice was continued until at nine o'clock the majority reached the Argyle shore, about 25 miles distant from where they had started on the morning of

the preceding day. At the end of the journey it was found that one of the crew was missing. A search party rappelled to the shore, where they found the fellow holding on to a shrub and speecheless. They carried him to the house in which the other members of the party were quartered, when they had to cut the boots from his feet, so badly were they frozen. Many of the party were subsequently taken to Charlottetown, where they had to be treated for pneumonia and lung troubles.

This, said Mr. Lonsom, will give you an idea of the dangerous condition of the Capes route. Such an experience as this naturally makes the experienced crews of to-day very careful in starting from either shore when the weather appears unsettled and threatening.

In two or three months, however, the present isolation of the island will have become a thing of the past. The ice floes will be replaced by magnificent stretches of water, and the cold and biting air will have ceased to exist. —Montreal Star.
