The Manufacture of Liquor. False.
For's Much Employment? False.
The manufacture and distribution of liquor provides some employment, but much less in proportion to capital invested, or sales turnover than the other forms of manufacture. The Canada Year Book shows one million dollars invested in other forms of industry employ on an average, six times more workers, and purchase three times the raw material than the manufacture of beverage alcohol requires.

Alcohol As A Beverage Diminishes Resistance To Disease? True.
Dr. Wm. Osler believed that alcohol greatly decreased resistance to pneumonia. After a study of more than 3,000 cases of pneumonia in Cooks County Hospital that mortality rate among excessive drinkers was over 40 per cent; among the moderate drinkers, 24 per cent; among the abstainers, 23 per cent. The abstainer had twice the likelihood to recover than the heavy drinker had.

Alcohol Consumption Increase Produces an Increase in the Number of Patients in Mental Hospitals? True.
Dr. Haven Emerson, of Columbia University, U. S. A., stated that on the average, 20 years of casual drinking precedes the arrival of many patients to the mental hospital. In 1920 the last year of prohibition there were 2,025 persons treated in B. C. mental hospitals. For the year ending March 31st, 1930, there were 4,471 treated. Mental hospitals are over-crowded.

As a matter of fact, the same person is not sufficient to be posted to talk in private, let alone on a platform. "Patriots, let's share the alibi; everyone is needed in this fight for sobriety; none can take your place, remember that. Dr. Little makes use of a bit of brilliant forward medical scientific and common-sense arguments against the use of cigarettes. He says, "Cigarettes have a powerful sedative effect. They set up a mental inertia that registers as a fixed mechanical habit—just like a

baby thumb-sucking. Tapping, lighting, puffing, flicking the ash, innating, puckering the eyes—it is a motor mechanism. You may actually be smoking only about two hours a day; it is the consciousness of not smoking that is the greater mental distraction.

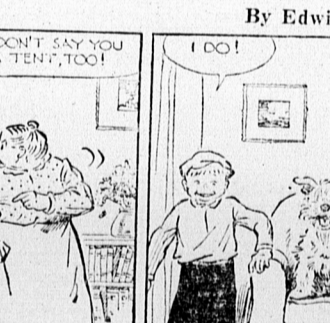
