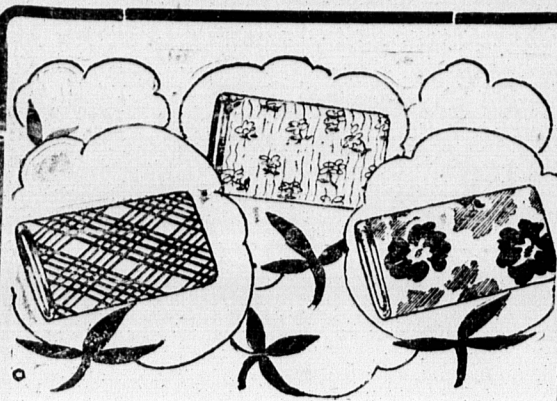

Did you ever have to live in a house with a chronic discourager? I have and, believe me, between the two I would choose a cheerful safe-cracker or an optimistic lady murderer every time for a steady companion.



To my thinking there is no other creature, whether two-footed or four-footed or crawling on its belly, that is so loathsome and does so much harm in the world as the human wet blanket. Certainly no one else does so much to take away the joy of living from their fellow creatures. No one else puts out the fire on so many altars. No one else pushes so many people down into failure.

And, alas, these pests abound in such great numbers there is scarcely a house that is not cursed by having one or more of them in it. When you marry the girl of your ideal or your Fairy Prince, they never rest until they wake you up from love's young dream by pointing out Maud's faults and John's shortcomings until they make you feel that you are a sucker who had a gold brick unloaded on you at the altar.

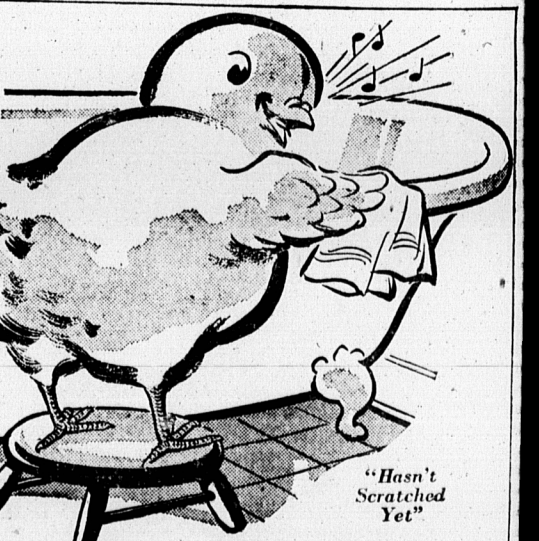

THE COOK'S CORNER

FISH SAUCE

- 1 tablespoon minced onion
1 tsp. butter
1 tablespoon flour
1-2 cup water
2 tablespoons vinegar
1 cup sour cream
1 tsp. granulated sugar
1-3 cup chopped dill pickle
1 tsp. minced parsley.

Cook the onion in the butter in a double boiler until tender. Add the flour; blend well and then add the remaining ingredients. Cook until smooth and thick, stirring constantly. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve with fish. Serves 6. To serve 2 or 3, make half this recipe.

SWEDISH MEAT BALLS

- 2 cups soft bread crumbs
3-4 cup bottled milk or 6 tbsp. evaporated milk and 6 tbsp.

- water.
1-2 cup minced onion
4 tablespoons butter
1-4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 lb. ground beef or pork and beef mixed
1-2 teaspoon salt
1-4 teaspoon paprika
1 egg, slightly beaten
2 tsp. flour
1-2 cup top milk or cream or evaporated milk.

Soak the bread crumbs in the milk for 10 minutes. Sauté the onion in 2 tablespoons butter until a delicate brown, then add with the meat, salt nutmeg, paprika and egg to the crumb mixture. Put this mixture through a food chopper. Form into balls about 1 1-2 inches in diameter and saute in a skillet in the remaining 2 tablespoons of butter until light brown on all sides. Sprinkle the flour over all, coat each meat ball well, then cover the skillet and cook 5 minutes. Add the top milk, cover, and cook 5 minutes longer. Add salt and pepper to the gravy if necessary. Serves 6. To serve 2 or 3, make half this recipe.
