SOURIS WEST. At the April meeting, the nine members met at the home of Miss Alice Kieckham. A red cross paper on maternal mortality was discussed. Some improvements are to be made in the school hall. Four members volunteered to clean the class-room of the school.

There was some further discussion on the matter. Mr. Lea contending to support his proposal that the tax be put on stands longer than pumps. Dr. MacNeill was of the opinion that the tax of \$150.00 per pump would be exorbitant for a man who had three or four pumps in his stand.

Dr. MacMillan did not think it was the intention of the city to put a tax on each pump in a service station which had more than one. The Premier thought that details of the taxation should be left with the city.

Mr. Harry Cox agreed with this view. He thought the clause should go through.

Hon. B. W. LePage called attention to the fact that citizens had an additional tax imposed on them by the City of \$10.00 on each car or cars owned and he thought this was unfair. He understood that people were having their cars registered here having their cars registered to evade the tax. He thought the tax should be \$50.00 per stand.

Mr. Dennis thought the matter was of concern only to the City. He was in favor of the clause.

Hon. Mr. Lea thought the car owners were being heavily taxed, and this was an additional burden. It was not fair to burden them further. It was a matter of concern to the car owners of the whole province, who bought gas in Charlottetown.

Hon. J. D. Stewart agreed with the views expressed by the Minister of Agriculture. He thought the clause should be amended to read \$50.00 per stand instead of \$50.00 per tank.

After further discussion the clause was amended by striking out the part of the clause limiting the tax to \$50.00 per pump.

Clause 5, as adopted in its amended form reads as follows: It shall be lawful for the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, and the City Council is hereby empowered, to make and pass a by-law or by-laws to impose or assess an annual license fee or tax on all retail vendors of gasoline or similar motor fuel within the City.

On motion of the Premier the act amending the prohibition act, was re-committed to the committee.

At 4:30 p.m. the House adjourned.

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LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

City Granted Power to Tax Vendors of Gasoline.

Legislative Assembly April 26th, 1928

MORNING SESSION The House resumed at 11:30 a.m. The Premier paid a tribute of respect to the late Alfred A. MacWilliams, who passed away on Sunday last. This was concurred in by Mr. W. H. Dennis and Hon. J. D. Stewart.

Dr. A. A. Macdonald enquired if a new portfolio, that of Minister of Irrigation was being established in view of the prohibition amendments. He suggested that Mr. Harry Cox be given the post.

Hon. B. W. LePage brought up the report of the contingent committee.

Hon. J. D. Stewart thought that it should, as customary be presented on the last day of the session.

The Premier concurred with him, so its presentation was duly deferred.

On motion of Dr. MacMillan, the act amending the acts incorporating the City of Charlottetown, was re-committed to the committee of the whole.

Dr. MacMillan asked that clause 5 which had been deleted, be replaced in the act. The putting up of tanks and pumps was becoming very common. They were being installed even by grocers and others.

It is said that the tanks are being supplied free by gasoline distributors to increase their sales. The legitimate vendors, he stated, wished the fine to be applied. He moved that the clause be restored.

Hon. W. M. Lea stated that, although he had opposed the clause yesterday, he had been approached by a delegation, who represented to him that many were being supplied with these tanks and pumps free, whereas those who had them along time had had to pay for them. However, they thought, and he thought, so, that the tax should be put on new stands opened, rather than fresh instalments of pumps.

Hon. B. W. LePage said that he also had been approached by delegations on the matter, but he had not changed his views on the matter that it was wrong to apply this tax. Four dealers who had been long in the business had expressed themselves to him as being opposed to it.

Mr. McLeure agreed with the Minister of Agriculture that the tax should be placed, not on each pump, but on each service station.

The Premier was of the opinion that the City Council were best qualified to decide what was needed in this regard.

Mr. Allen Stewart said that while he opposed the clause yesterday he had done so under a misunderstanding. He thought the clause should be re-inserted.

Hon. J. D. Stewart agreed with the Premier that the Corporation of the City were able to deal with the other, and that it should lie within their jurisdiction.

Hon. Mr. Lea moved an amendment to the clause that the tax be put on each stand, rather than on each pump.

Hon. J. D. Stewart asked the Minister of Agriculture how he would define a service station. Let the Council work out the details of them by law. Why should we undertake it?
