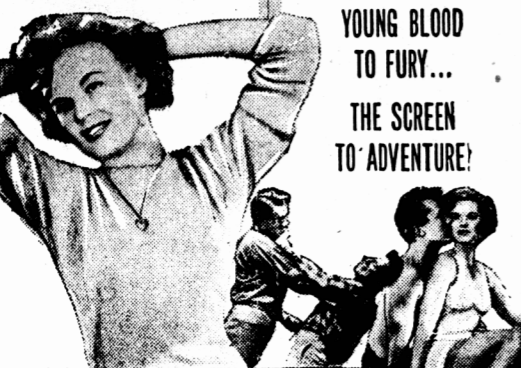

Uigg Teachers Fall Convention

The annual Uigg Teachers' Fall Convention was held on Sept. 19 with a very fine representation of teachers from Southern King's. Morning sessions opened with appointment of committees: Resolution Committee: Miss Irene Bruce and Mr. J. B. McConnell; Nominating Committee: Mrs. Gertrude Whiteway and Mrs. Louise Stewart; Question Box Committee, Miss Zelta MacLeod and Mr. Arthur O'Shea.

Mr. Gilmore, supervisor of schools in his remarks dealt with matters regarding teacher's reports, provincial grants to districts building or improving schools, etc. His remarks were followed by a talk on Red Cross work by Mrs. MacCallum. She reported that \$3 per cent of the Island schools has organized Red Cross groups. This is the highest percentage of any Province in Canada.

At noon recess the teachers were guests of the Uigg W. I. at a delicious luncheon. Afternoon session was opened by the discussion of many vital questions from the question box. Owing to this long discussion period Mr. L. W. Shaw, Director of Education delivered a very brief address and gave some of the time allotted to him over to Mrs. Wilcox from P. W. C. The teachers enjoyed greatly a paper on Language read by Mrs. Willet; and an address on Literature given by Miss Helen Yeo, also of P. W. C. Rev. W. Mercer spoke briefly on Temperance. Mr. Royston Murgford on teaching music and the annual Music Festival and Mrs. Cudmore on the teaching of First Aid in the schools.

N. B. Tubers Awaiting Shipment To Havana

SAINT JOHN, N. B. Sept. 22—(CP) — One hundred thousand bushels of certified seed potatoes grown in the potato belt of New Brunswick are being stored in West Basin John ahead awaiting shipment to Havana, Cuba, for stocking potato farms in that country.

They are packed in three-bushel barrels and more than 33,000 containers were required. The S. S. Bonita, which arrived in port today from Baltimore, will take the first shipment of 45,000 bushels.

Agricultural Institute Meeting

The monthly meeting of the Prince Edward Island Branch of the Agricultural Institute of Canada was held at Birch Court Experimental Station, Charlottetown on September 15.

The meeting opened with the showing of a film by Mr. John Martin on Mastitis of dairy cattle. The symptoms, control and preventive measures of this disease—which causes a loss of some thirty million dollars every year—were stressed and all members present were in general agreement that a definite need exists for an educational program to help combat this destructive disease.

Following the completion of routine business an interesting talk was given by Mr. Ralph MacLean of the Provincial Department of Agriculture and Education. Mr. MacLean dealt with Agricultural Education on Prince Edward Island. He stated that in grade one to eight of the public schools little attention is given to the teaching of agriculture. This situation, he said, results from the fact that the teachers have too much other work to do, and also because they are not prepared to teach agriculture. In grade nine and ten some attempt is being made but the lack of a good text book makes the task difficult.

He said, however, that the Provincial Department of Education has published a booklet containing thirty lessons on Science and Agriculture and this has in some measure supplied the need for a text book on Prince Edward Island Agriculture.

General Course Needed

Mr. MacLean pointed out that a general course in agriculture should be given to students planning to return to the farm. He stressed, however, that the only way a worthwhile educational program could be undertaken was by the active co-operation of the Provincial and Federal Departments of Agriculture and the Provincial Department of Education.

Mr. Joseph Galway, national secretary of the farm radio forum, who is on a tour of Canada, gave a short address in which he explained the present organization and aims and future plans. The text on his own operation for the past nine years, he stated, and during that time has had four broadcasts per month from November to March each season. The local forum, he said, was properly organized under good leadership, give the farmers an opportunity to get together and talk over their mutual problems and by co-operative efforts they are better able to solve them. Mr. Galway stated that last year there were sixty-seven organized groups on Prince Edward Island and that this year it is hoped to increase the number to one hundred and thirty.

HOMES FOR REFUGEES

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 22—(AP) — Australia has offered to take an unlimited number of Europe's 800,000 refugees. Brig. F. G. Callegan, head of the Australian military mission in Germany, relayed the offer yesterday to the International Refugee Organization. The message said Australia can provide first class resettlement opportunities for an unlimited number of displaced persons.

LONDON, Sept. 22—(AP) — The Earl of Craven, 31, was ordered imprisoned today until he pays for the maintenance of his estranged actress wife and eight-year-old daughter. The Earl was charged with disregarding a court order issued last July to pay £270 (\$1,480) for maintenance of his family.
