### THE TIME TABLE.

On the 18th of October last The Guardian printed the winter time table of the Prince Edward Island Railway as first proposed with general comments thereon, commending what we thought were its good features and making this important reservation, which we now quote: "But the service between Summerside and Charlottetown and vice versa is, in our opinion far from satisfactory. According to the above arrangements it will not be possible to come from Summerside to Charlottetown and return same day, or to go from Charlottetown to Summerside and return same day."

The time table as since amended and now in force makes it practicable to go from Charlottetown to Summerside, have four hours there and return every day in the week, but does not make it possible to come from Summerside to Charlottetown and return every day. What Charlottetown must have, to be treated fairly is a service which will enable passengers from Summerside and intervening points to come to this city, have at least four hours here every day in the week and return home the same evening.

In the few days intervening before this can be arranged, the Cape Traverse train should be run into Charlottetown as an express every morning on its arrival at Emerald Junction, returning as an express as late as possible each afternoon, thus giving ample time for persons along the route to transact business in this city.

It will be seen from the above that The Guardian has from the first earnestly contended for the additional service west that would give sufficient time and opportunity for persons living along the line to reach the city daily, transact their business here and return the same day.

In our news columns will be found a brief mention of a schooner sailing from Murray Harbor to Pictou on Saturday last. And yet with schooner navigation open the winter steamers do not venture to come near Charlottetown, the principal port of the Island.

The four candidates for the next federal election in Queen's County are now all in the field, and we may presume that more or less canvassing will go on hereafter. We beg respectfully to suggest to the sitting members, Messrs Martin and McLean, and the Liberal candidates, Messrs Warburton and Prowse, that they come to an agreement not to use either liquor or money in their canvass or at the election and to discourage as far as they can prevent their agents or canvassers from engaging in any corrupt practice. Such a course would commend itself to all right-thinking electors in the country, would promote sobriety and a pure ballot and would form a worthy example for all other candidates throughout the Dominion. We understand that at least one of the four candidates has expressed his willingness to make an agreement of this kind.

The New York Sun affirms that "there is a great unrest and greater uneasiness in the air than there was before Fort Sumter was fired on." And it charges that President Roosevelt is responsible for this state of things; that in his desire for reelection he is exchanging the strenuous for the turbulent life, is sowing dragon's teeth and is inviting the violence of the poor against the rich.

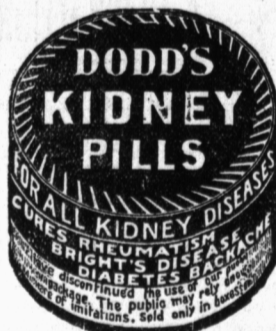
In 111 Ontario municipalities campaigns are in progress for a local option vote on the question of closing the bars and shutting out the retail sale of liquors. It requires a three-fifths vote to do this, which may be the means of defeating the bylaw in some cases where the majority are in the favor. This is strongly objected to by the temperance people, but the Government contends it will give increased stability to a bylaw when once adopted.

The Saint John newspapers in their references to the late Liberal convention held here have not had much to say about the announced return of Mr. Blair to political life. The Telegraph, The Globe and the Sun to hand are silent on the subject. The Times, (independent,) refers briefly to "the challenge of Col. McLean to Mr. Blair." It adds that "his (Mr. Blair's) strength in the party is as undoubted as his ability to serve the interests of his constituents."

### SHEEP VERSUS DOGS.

SIR—A few days ago I noticed a letter in The Guardian from J. J. Hughes, M. P., discussing the destruction of sheep by dogs, and while I agree with Mr. Hughes that the dog question is a most serious one, to all connected with the sheep-raising industry from the farmer to the buyer, I do not think it would be wise to demand a wholesale massacre of all the dogs in the Province. This would be inhuman as well as unjust. The dog has on too many occasions proven man's truest friend, to have his race cut off because of the sins of some of his fellows. But there is no question that the farmers will endorse a good stiff dog-tax law—one that will cause the extermination of the cur but will also tend to the breeding of good dogs for use on the farm. How is it that in this Province there cannot be obtained the Scotch collie and the English



sheep-dog? These dogs would be a help and not a hindrance to sheep farming. As the writer is largely interested in sheep raising he would like to see the question fully discussed.

It is said that a sharp-toned bell on every fifth sheep will cause the dogs to keep their distance. Be that as it may we would like the dog and sheep question kept before the public until the Legislature meets and we think the member who brings in a bill to tax dogs will have the support of the farmers. The newspapers must do the educative work. The Farmers' Institutes are good in their way but do not seem to be a great force in many sections and they can hardly be looked upon as reliable exponents of public opinion. We would like the sheep men to state their opinions in the press at once and trust that we will have your support in our demand for a reasonable dog tax. The tax should go to provide a fund to recoup to the owner the value of the sheep destroyed. The next few weeks is the time for action in this matter.

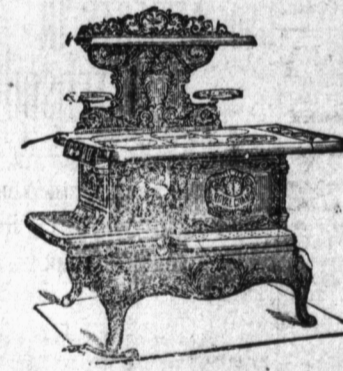
