100th Annual Report Of Bank Of Nova Scotia

It is unusual in a young country like Canada, to have many corporations whose operations extend over more than a relatively limited number of years, and it is of more than passing interest, therefore, that the 100th statement of the Bank of Nova Scotia issued today is the One Hundredth Annual Report of the Bank. The report, as is customary with this fine old Bank, is a strong one, showing profits practically unchanged from 1930 and the continuance of a strong liquid position.

Earnings for the year amount to \$2,579,802.29, as compared with \$2,535,643 in 1930. However, it will be recalled that in 1930 a new issue of \$2,000,000 Capital Stock was put out, with the result that the average capital for that year was lower than in 1931. Consequently, the profits shown in 1931 are a slightly lower percentage of Capital and Reserve than those shown in 1930. From the profits for the year \$1,920,000 was paid out in dividends, \$120,000 was required for circulation tax, \$115,000 was contributed to the Officers' Pension Fund and \$400,000 written off Bank Premises, with the final result that the balance at Profit & Loss was increased from \$534,839.98 to \$559,633.27.

Total deposits are \$201,446,959, as compared with \$200,042,256.87. The increase is almost evenly divided between deposits bearing interest and those not bearing interest.

Cash holdings, consisting of Current Coin, Dominion Notes and United States and foreign currencies, amount to \$24,261,036.54, which is 10.75% of public liabilities. Quick assets total \$123,607,941.98 or 54.82% of liabilities.

The Bank's Investment Accounts show an increase of \$7,758,761.57, which is explained as being due to increased borrowings by Municipalities and grain customers. Current Loans and Discounts other than in Canada have declined from 1.6—114,296.42 to \$14,586,191.95. The Bank's total assets stand at \$252,495,455.07, as compared with \$253,115,861.52.
