Robinson Chosen Top National League Player

NEW YORK, Nov. 18—(AP)—It was ice cream, cake and presents for Jackie Robinson, Jr., today, as his father—second baseman for the Brooklyn Dodgers—gave a birthday party and took a few bows himself.

Jackie, Sr., learned today that he had been chosen the National League's most valuable player for 1949 by the Baseball Writers' Association.

"Of course, this comes a nice surprise," the second sacker of the pennant-winning Dodgers said at his home here.

Only three other players finished over the 100-point level. Enos Slaughter, also of the Cardinals, was third with 181; Ralph Kiner of Pittsburgh, the league's leading home run clouter with 54, received 133 points; and Pee Wee Reese, Brooklyn's sparkling shortstop, was fifth with 113 points.

Musial has won the most valuable award three times, in 1943, 1946 and 1948.

Observer Sees Hopes For World Peace In U.N.

Over a 10-year period George Hamilton, as staff correspondent of the Canadian Press, covered the League of Nations at Geneva.

At first glance, there is a disturbing parallel between the United Nations and the old League. Names, personalities and problems have changed.

In its dying years the League was under the menace of Nazi Germany and the Axis powers.

Both the United Nations and the League were created with one primary purpose in view—maintenance of peace with security.

The Council of the League could only "recommend" on the use of armed force. The Security Council can "call" on members to contribute to the maintenance of peace.

Other Side of Picture But that is only one side of the Lake Success picture. There is another, more hopeful side.

It has been able to halt conflicts affecting the fortunes of 500,000,000 people.

The Soviet Union's abuse of the Security Council veto is not a cause but a symptom of failure.

But will the U.N. succeed where the League failed? Will it keep the peace or will it follow the League to disaster and war?

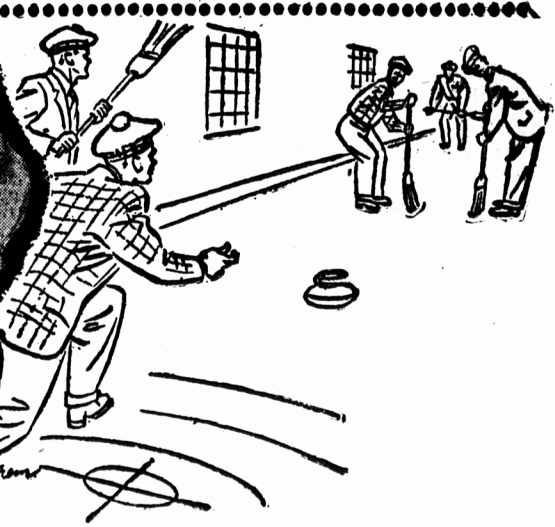
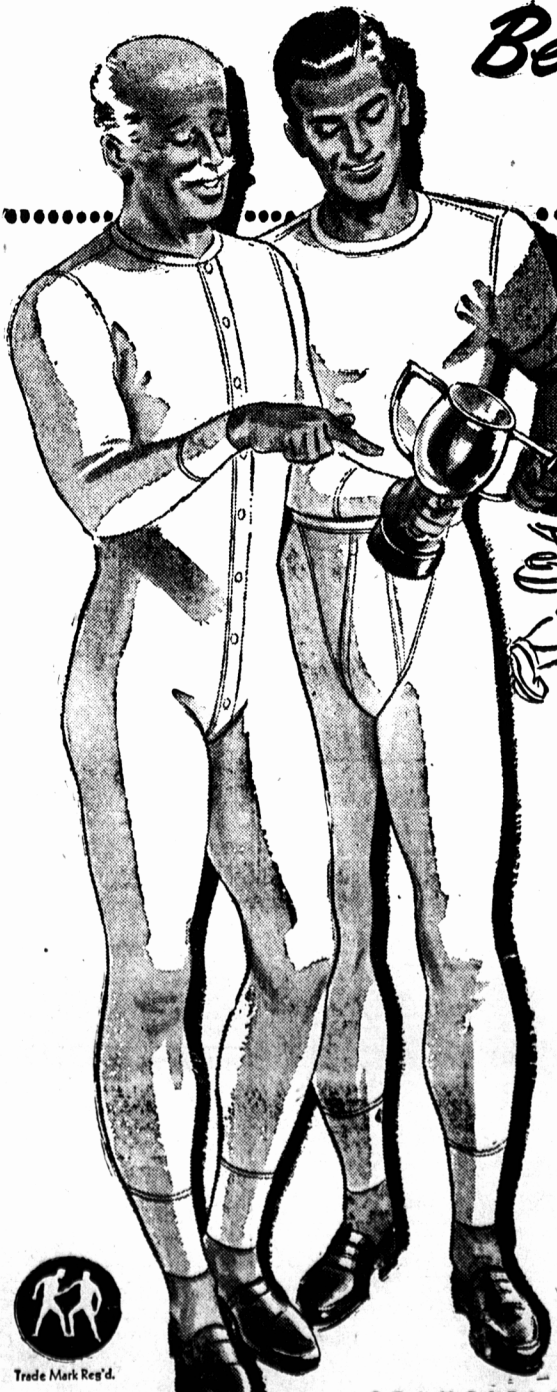
