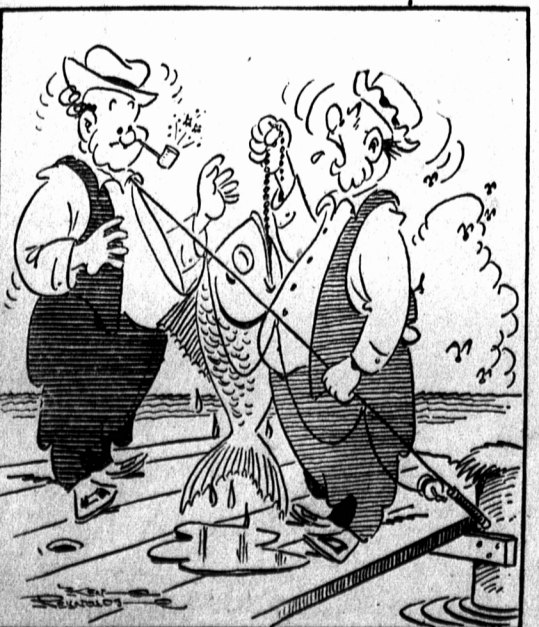

IN MEMORIAM

JOHN J. CREAMER
A pall of gloom was cast over Souris and vicinity on November 6th, when it became known that John J. Creamer had passed away suddenly. Although the deceased had been in poor health for more than a year, he was able to be about until the day of his passing. The deceased was born at North Lake 33 years ago. Having completed his primary education in the public school, he entered St. Dunstan's University to continue his studies. But World War I intervened, and he enlisted in the Army, serving two and one-half years overseas with the C. E. F. After demobilization he lived for some years in U. S. A. and Western Canada. In 1930 he returned to Souris where he established Creamer's Meat Market, which he successfully conducted until his death. The deceased, familiarly known as Jack, had a very wide circle of friends. He was a man of fine character, frank, sincere and honest in all his dealings, the kind of man, who, when he had decided on a course of action spared no effort on his own part to bring it to a successful conclusion. At the same time he knew how to see the bright side of everything, as many will attest. So it is that he will be sorely missed, not only in his own home, but in all that pertains to the general welfare of the community at large, where he took a real and lively interest in educational, civic and church activities. An ardent horse racing fan, he could always be counted upon to do his share towards the promotion of that sport. But naturally it is in his family that he will be most sadly mourned. Here his provident care, kindly sympathy, strong moral and religious convictions made him a loving and dutiful father and husband. His passing leaves a void in the family circle that never can be filled. Time can and does heal the wounds left by the passing of a loved one, but memories linger on. Besides a sorrowing wife, formerly Margaret McCabe, Iona, he leaves to mourn his loss the following children, all at home: Louise, Norma, Sterling, Claude, Neville and Kevin, also four sisters, Mrs. J. H. Klassen, Prince Albert, Sask.; Mrs. Mabel Bean, Mrs. Eva Frielander and Kathleen, of Everett, Mass.

His funeral, which was very largely attended, was held to St. Mary's Church, Souris, on November 9th, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the Pastor, Msgr. J. A. Murphy, who also conducted the services at the grave. Also present in the Sanctuary were Rev. George MacDonald, St. Margaret's, and Rev. Charles McCarthy, Iona. The pall-bearers were M. J.
