It was found that she had suffered a paralytic stroke from which she never rallied. Her husband died six years ago last fall and, besides an exceptionally wide circle of friends, there are left to mourn one son, Mr. J. W. Sullivan, of Denver, Colorado, and two daughters, Mrs. Gimball, of Halliwood, Vancouver, B. C., and Miss Ruby at home, to whom our sincere sympathy is extended in their sudden sorrow. The absent ones are now on the way home and upon their arrival the funeral will be held, probably on Sunday next.

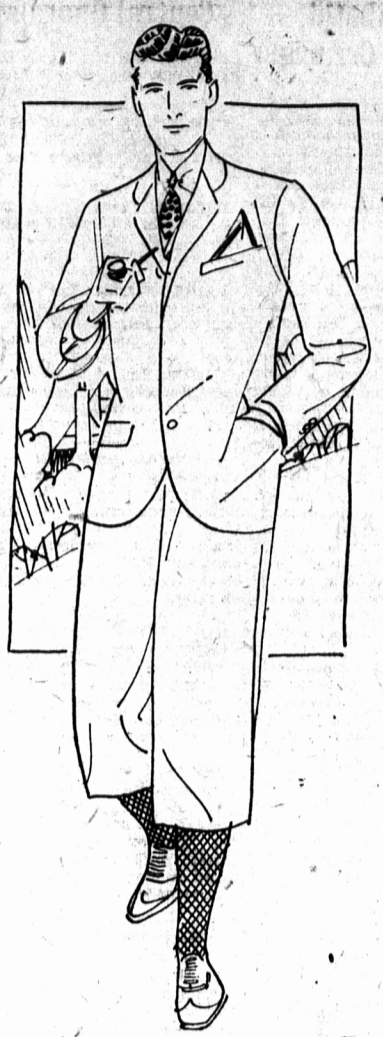

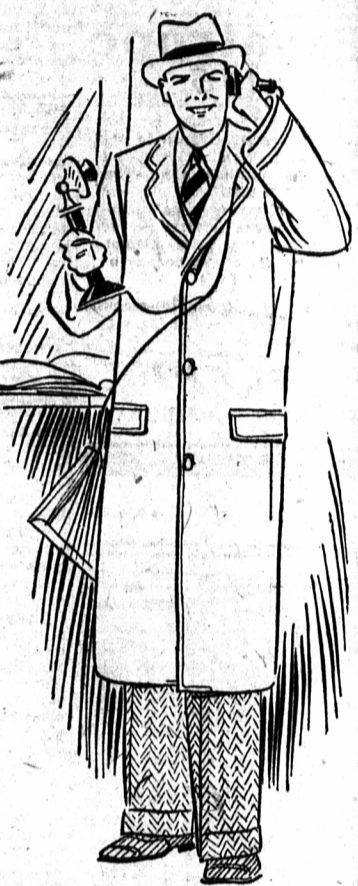

Summerside Town Council Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of Summerside Town Council was held on Monday night with the Mayor and all the Councillors present.

After routine, the following accounts were passed:—Town bills, paid, \$2827.38; unpaid, \$724.75. Electric light bills, paid, \$487.23; unpaid, \$1666.84.

Communications were read from Messrs. Taylor & MacNeill asking permission to install a new gasoline tank in the alleyway adjoining their garage and stating that they would then remove all their gasoline pumps, etc., off Water Street by November 1st. On motion of Councillor Phillips the request was granted. An offer by them of \$35 for the old oil tank formerly used at the old electric plant was, on motion, left with the Electric Light Committee to deal with.

Like action was taken with a communication from Mr. James Arthur and others petitioning to have a street light placed on the corner of Eustace and Calhoun Streets.

A communication from the School Board notifying the Council that Mr. Wilfred Gaudet's term as School Trustee expires on June 18th was read and, on motion of Councillor Strong, Mr. Mark Gaudet was appointed in his stead.

A letter from Mr. Lowell Hancock asking for an extension of the electric light and power service to his ranch was, on motion of Councillor Robinson, referred to the Electric Light Committee.

It was moved and carried unanimously that a motor street sprinkler be purchased from Messrs. Taylor & MacNeill as per their quotation for same, namely \$2985. f. o. b., Woodstock, Ont.

In brief reports of Committees adopted there was some discussion regarding work done on the streets, mostly complimentary to Councillor Phillips, and a good deal was said by the Mayor and most of the Councillors about speeding and infractions of the traffic by-laws generally. Councillor Robinson especially spoke very strongly on the matter and called for immediate remedy. In the end Councillor Phillips moved that the Chairman of the Police Committee be authorized to engage a traffic cop and special police officer for one month at a salary of \$70. Carried.

On motion of Councillor Phillips, the Police Committee was authorized to procure three uniforms and four badges for the police officers.

After the monthly report of the engineer of the electric plant had been read and it together with a requisition for supplies needed passed, Councillor Schurman moved that the electric plant be closed on Sundays from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. until further notice, for overhauling the plant.

The Mayor reported that as the government dredge was here he had taken up with Mr. A. E. MacLean, M. P., the matter of dredging at the Town Wharf. Mr. MacLean took the matter up with the Public Works Department and the engineer of the department is now at Summerside making a survey of the work needed.

The Mayor then read a letter from Mr. J. W. Hamilton, Founder-Secretary of the International Magna Charta Day Association and stated that he had decided to issue

the following proclamation to the people of Summerside:—

Whereas, the granting of the Magna Charta at Runnymede on the 15th day of June, 1215, laid the foundation for the security of the political, civil and religious liberty which we all enjoy;

And, whereas, the annual commemoration of Magna Charta Day serves to promote unity, friendliness and understanding among the English speaking nations of the world;

Now, therefore, I, J. Frank Arnett, Mayor of the Town of Summerside, do hereby urge the people of our town, including all public and private schools, to observe the 15th day of June, as the anniversary of the granting of Magna Charta; and I do especially urge that all churches and Sunday Schools of all denominations on the Third Sunday in June, the 17th—Magna Charta Sunday—do emphasize the responsibility which rests upon all English speaking peoples of maintaining peace, harmony and good will among the nations of the earth.
