S.P.C.A. NOTES

The usual number of dogs and cats have been picked up this week by the S.P.C.A. inspector, and humanely destroyed. One dog bit by car immediately dispatched.

A great many cats have been responded to by the Inspector both in city and country and 19 cases of distemper have been reported.

As there is difficulty in disposing of the bodies of animals done away with, the Inspector will only handle emergency cases during the hot weather.

The prevalence of distemper among dogs, makes it advisable for owners to keep dogs from running at large and watching them carefully. If symptoms appear, it is wise to report to a veterinarian at once, and have a serum treatment.

Some of the symptoms are drooping of the head, loss of appetite—sometimes vomiting—running at eyes and nose, etc. The animal should be isolated until a veterinary has seen him. Avoid feeding heavy foods and allow animals plenty of water.

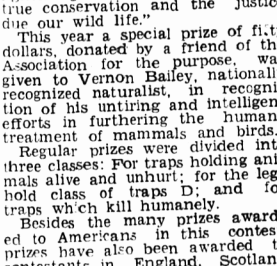

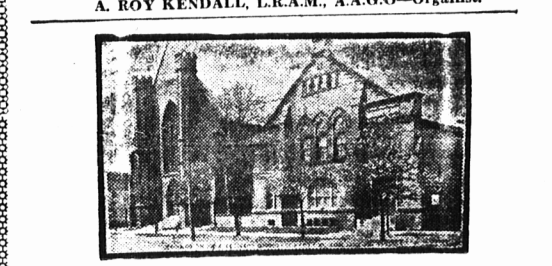

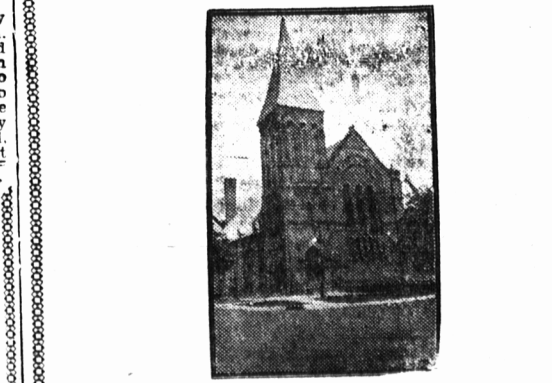
