LONDON, May 26.—By a vote of 351 to 274, a majority of 77, the House of Commons yesterday read a third time the Irish Home Rule Bill.

MR. REDMOND'S VIEWS

John E. Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, in a statement this evening, says that the division in the House of Commons is equivalent to the passage of the Home Rule Bill into law and expresses the earnest hope that the Ulsterites "who are genuinely nervous as to their position, will abandon unreasonable demands and enter into a conciliatory discussion with their fellow countrymen with regard to the points of the Bill upon which they desire further safeguards."

ENGLAND'S REAL GLORY

Then the preacher asked: "I wonder what is the chief glory of the English people? There are many things that mark our distinction. The conquests of the English nation have been great. British possessions are in all parts of the earth. It is a marvellous story concerning the broadening of the British borders. We are proud to say that these conquests have not always been free from just criticism, but we believe the record of the English nation is cleaner than that of any other colonizing nation on the earth. England stands for justice and fair-play wherever she has established herself. But the mighty conquests of England are not her chief glory. Neither is her immense wealth. London is the financial center of the world and her navy rules the sea. Kipling in his 'Recessional' has given us the true note. The preacher here recited this noble ode. He concluded, after a careful examination, that the real glory of England was in God, as manifested in Jesus Christ."

HINDUS AT VICTORIA WILL TEST IMMIGRATION LAWS

VICTORIA, May 23.—The Steamship Komogata Maru, with over four hundred Hindus on board, arrived here last night, and at once was placed in quarantine. This vessel which has been specially chartered to bring several hundred Hindus over to Canada to test the immigration laws, and in regard to which an order has been received from Ottawa to prevent their landing on Canadian soil. It is stated that every effort will be made by the Hindus to effect entry to this country, but all precautions have been taken to deal with the situation should the necessity arise.
