HORSE NOTE.

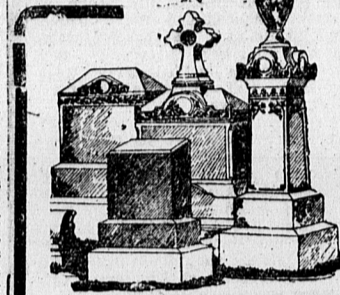
