BORDEN TEAM ELIMINATES SUMMERSIDE

Nationals Defeat Crystals 6-4 In Second Game To Take Series Round 9-8

Borden Nationals last night won their way into the finals for the intermediate Prince Edward Island hockey championship when they defeated Summerside Crystals 6-4 in the second game of the semi-final total goal series. The Borden victory gave them the series 9 to 8, Crystals having won the opener in Summerside 4-3. The game played before 600 howling fans was the fastest and one of the cleanest ever played in the Borden rink. Only five penalties were handed out during the struggle, but it was one of these that gave the winners the opening goal to notch up the telling goal. With less than three minutes to go Steele was waved off for hooking and on their third assault Borden registered, Oscar Campbell firing the puck home from a mix-up in front of the Summerside net.

It gave me, a former Islander, a great deal of pleasure, to see the remarkable showing made by Leslie and without question he was one of the four best men in the tournament. I do not have the pleasure of knowing Mr. Leslie but felt, in justice to him, an explanation should be made to the folks back home.

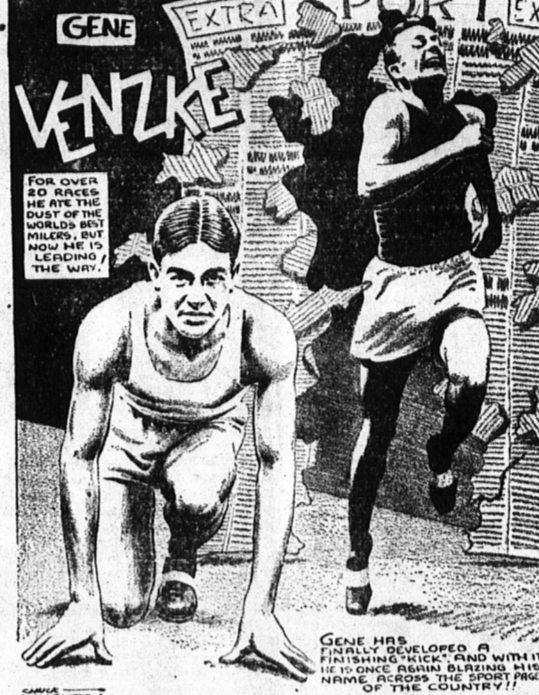

Heavy Scoring In The N.H.L. Last Week

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Feb. 24—Heavy firing along several fronts resulted in spectacular gains by almost a dozen players and changed the grouping of leaders in both sections, weekly statistics of the National Hockey League showed tonight.

Hooley Smith, Montreal Maroons star centre, bounded up in the lists with nine additional points during the week, three goals and six assists, for the best gain. Others to advance rapidly were Dave Schriener, Americans, four; Larry Northcott, Maroons, five; Neil Stewart, Americans, six; Eddy Wiseman, Americans, five; Jimmy Ward, Maroons, five; Doc Rommes, Chicago, five; Paul Thompson, Chicago, four and Mush March, Chicago, six.

After the shooting was over Cecil Dillon of New York Rangers had been ousted from his first place in the United States section by both Rommes and Thompson. Rommes 11 goals, 21 assists, 32 points gave him first position with Thompson a point back with 15-31 and Dillon next, 18-18-29.

In the Canadian section Schriener held his group leadership and top position in the whole league with 17-15-32, Chapman third, 9-22-31 and Northcott fourth, 12-18-30. Charlie Conacher and Bill Thoms of Toronto were pushed out of the first four by Smith and Northcott.

Dillon still led the league with most goals, 18, with Smith second. Top in assists were Chapman's 22. Red Horner of Maple Leafs continued to visit the penalty box frequently to reach 138 minutes, by far the league's highest figure.

Bill Miller Going Good With Canucks

A change of uniform has given Bill Miller the chance he lacked with Maroons for in one week's campaigning with Canucks he has scored one goal and earned two assists, playing defence, for three points, his first scoring points of the N. H. L. season. Up until a week ago he had registered neither a goal nor an assist with Maroons.

The former Moncton Hawk led former Marltimers in the week's point-earning, Bill Cowley and Joffre Desllets scored a goal each for Boston and Canadiens respectively and Pete Kelly picked up an assist with Detroit.

In the International League Ron Hudson, Aubrey Webster and Owen Lannon were the only three former Big Four performers to gain, each adding a single point. Jack Keating of Saint John was the only gainer of more than a point in the Canadian American when he scored a goal and assisted in another.

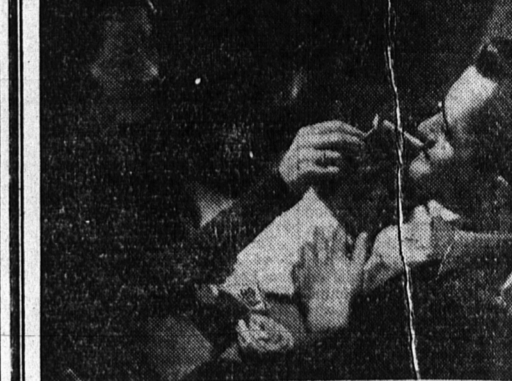
Former Abbies Starring In Denver

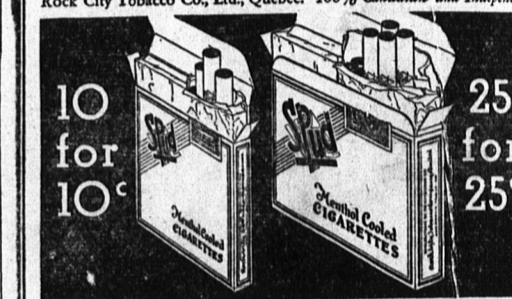
Both goalies MacEwen and MacInnis were highly praised for their work between the uprights.

Five World Records Are Established At A.A.U. Meet

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Feb. 23—In a National A. A. U. indoor track and field meet which saw five world record performances, Canada captured a single championship and lost another by the ruling of officials.

Sammy Richardson of the Achilles Club, Toronto, won the running broad jump with a leap of 24 feet 3 inches.

Henry (Hank) Cleman of the same outfit and holder of the world's mile indoor walking championship was disqualified after finishing first in the 1,500 metre heel and toe race.

Cleman, the defending champion, Louis Welch of Boston, who finished second, and William Haise of New York who finished fifth, all were ruled out for "unfair walking."

Charles Eschenbach of the New York A. C. who finished third, 100 yards behind Cleman, was declared the winner. Second place went to the only other finisher in a small field, Morris Davis of New York.

In the broad jump Richardson was followed by the 1932 Olympic champion, Ed Gordon, Iowa City, with a leap of 22 feet 11 1-8 inches. In third place came W. E. Fackert of Princeton, 22 feet 10 1-2 inches.

Gene Venzke, University of Pennsylvania, ran 1,500 meters in 3:49.9 for a new world record, defeating his former rival, Glenn Cunningham, for the third successive time.

"It was the fastest pace I ever followed," the young collegian said. "I didn't try to pass him until the stretch. I was counting on that long straightaway to the tape."

Venzke's race over-shadowed four other world record breaking performances. Sixteen thousand spectators sat for an hour after the running events were concluded to watch Dave Burke, a Cleveland negro who is a freshman at Marquette University, tie with Cornelius Johnson, a negro from Los Angeles at six feet, 8 15-16 inches in the high jump.

Eddie O'Brien, pointed-jawed Syracuse University star, did 600 meters in 1:21 to win by five yards with another new world record.

James J. Johnston of Madison Square Garden today wired Max and Buddy Baer offers to meet the winner of the Primo Camerata-Isidor Gastanaga heavyweight match, scheduled for March 6 in the Garden.

Max Baer was quoted last week as planning a comeback. However, if he is not serious about it, Johnston hopes Buddy Baer will talk the fight.
