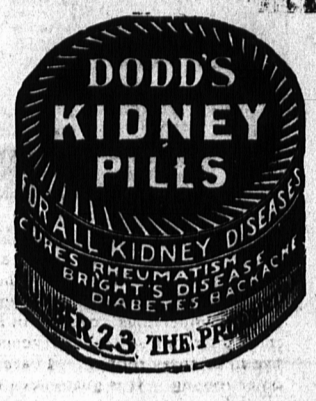
running of automobiles in this province. (2) The returns of the vote taken at such meetings. (3) The petitions received by the Government for and against the running of automobiles in the country roads and Royalty and on the country roads of this province.

Mr. Hughes gives notice that he will ask the Leader of the Government to lay on the table of this House answers to the following questions, respecting the Government School Supply:

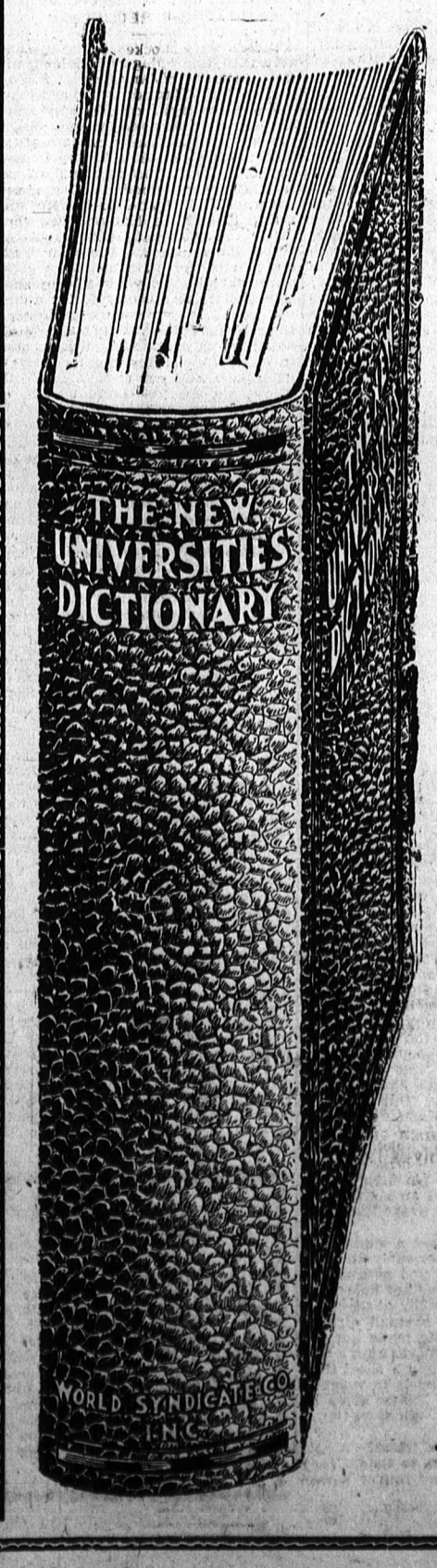
(1) Who orders the school books and school supplies? (2) How often is stock taken of quantities on hand? (3) Are goods sold for cash, or is credit given to any person or firm? If so, give name of persons and amounts due by same? (4) Are books and supplies sold over the counter retail to school children and students by the manager at same price as sold to dealers, or is full price charged? If so, how are the sales accounted for? (5) Submit statement of amount paid for stock, salaries and other expenses. Also amount of cash received for sale of books and supplies to December 31st, 1914. (6) What check is there on the cash taken in and paid out? (7) Is an audit made, how often and who is the auditor? (8) Does Mr. Landrigan send in a report of purchases and sales? If so, to whom and how often? (9) Table reports received by Government from Mr. Landrigan up to December 31st, 1914. (10) What salary does Mr. Landrigan receive? Are any assistants employed and what amount is paid them? (11) When did Mr. Landrigan take charge of the Department and what amount was paid him for his services up to December 31st, 1914?

(12) is the Government School Supply doing a retail business, thereby taking the business out of the hands of the bookstore dealers?
