Irregular Trend On New York Exchange

(By Frederick Gardner, Associated Press Financial Writer)
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Undercurrents of returning confidence in financial markets were strengthened by additional evidence of seasonal business expansion but bulls were in no hurry to extend their positions.

An active run of trading in stocks around the opening, with no appreciable advance in prices, indicated the market had entered a zone of increased supply. The market backed away and the list turned irregular while trading quieted.

Further gains in secondary issues, particularly lower grade rails, imparted a firm tone to the bond market. In keeping with the general picture of waning inflation psychology, commodities sagged, finishing 3-8 to 7-8 of a cent a bushel lower and cotton 35 to 60 cents a bale lower.

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Utility and alcohol shares forged ahead in early trading. American Commercial Alcohol, Schenley, U. S. Industrial Alcohol and other members of the group were up fractionally to more than 1 percent at one time but their gains were shaved or eliminated before the close.

U. S. Smelting responded with a net gain of about a point to the declaration of another dividend of \$2 a share on the common. Merchandise shares generally held firm as trade reports continued to stress the relatively favorable trend of re-buying goods.

In midst of discussion of a local transit tax, New York City Traction shares weakened, Brooklyn-Manhattan Transit losing 2-4 points. Rail shares softened with the general list. Santa Fe, New York Central and Union Pacific were among the carrier issues that yielded some of their previous gains.

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Fractional Gains Made On Montreal Stock Market

MONTREAL, Sept. 26—Gains of one to two points were made on the Montreal stock exchange. Advances ranged from a small fraction to three points whereas losses were mainly minor fractions.

Features of today's trading period were the activity and strength of bank issues and the fractional weakness of the interlisted stocks. Five bank stocks appeared in board lots, of which four gained and the fifth declined a fraction. Nickel Brazilian and Canadian Pacific were weaker in sympathy with the late irregularity of the New York market.

The widest movements of the day were engaged in by Dominion Glass, up two points at 92, Steel of Canada common, up 1-2 at 38 1/4, Steel of Canada preferred, up 1-3 at 37 5/8 and Bell Telephone 1-2 higher at 120. Advances of one point were scored by Bruck Silk

and National Steel Car, each selling at 14. Among the banks, Nova Scotia rose three points at 255 while Royal gained a full point at 163, Montreal advanced 1-2 to 201 and Dominion, in its first board lot transaction for many months, was off 1-2 at 154 1/2. Commerce was 5-8 higher at 175. Commerce was off 1-2 at 154 1/2. Brazilian Traction was 1-4 lower at 11 1/2. International Nickel declined 1-4 at 24 and Canadian Pacific lost 1-4 at 13 1/4. Hollinger was 20 cents lower at 20.80 while fractional losses were suffered by Canadian Industrial Al at 10 1/4, Lake of the Woods, Shawinigan Power and National Breweries.

Among issues to rise fractions were Power Corporation, Canada Cement, McCall Frontenac, Dominion Steel and Coal "B," Consolidated Smelting and B. C. Power "A." Montreal Power at 32 1/4 was unchanged as were Cocksbut Flow, Quebec Power and Gypsum Lime. Sales 10,500 shares; Bonds \$11,150.

MONTREAL, Sept. 26—Butter (large) at slightly earlier in price while prices of other products remained unchanged on the Montreal produce and dairy market today. Eggs were quoted at 19 1/2 cents a pound in cartons or less against yesterday's level of 19 1/2 to 19 3/4 cents. To the retail trade, small lots brought 20 1/2 cents for solid and 21 1/2 cents for prints. Only three boxes were received.

On the cheese market, Ontario colored was priced at 10 1/2 cents a pound while Quebec colored brought 9 1/2 cents. Ontario white, September's was 10 1/2 cents a pound and Quebec white sold at 9 1/2 cents. Receipts totalled 1,760 boxes.

Egg quotations were again unchanged, great shipments in cartons or less being 28 cents a dozen for A large, 26 cents for A medium, 21 cents for B and 18 cents for C. Arrivals totalled 2,774 cases.

New Quebec potatoes were 55 to 45 cents per 50 pound bag and new N. B. mountains brought 55 cents 80 pound bag. Old stock sold at 24 to 25 cents per 80 pound bag.

Bacon was mostly grassers and were sold between \$2 and \$2.50. There was a firm undertone to the lamb market. Sellers were refusing bids of \$5.75 for good ewes and wethers.

Bacon was \$8 fed and watered, selecters drew \$1 per hog premium. Butchers, hogs and lights were \$7.50 and extra hives \$7.50. Sows were mostly \$6 to \$6.50.

CROP REPORT EXCHANGE

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MARITIME PROVINCES
Reports from New Brunswick indicate that although short in the straw, the yield of barley, wheat and oats will be up to average. Potatoes are a good crop and other root crops are progressing favourably. The apple crop is light. Pastures are in fair condition. In Nova Scotia the yield of grains will fall below average due to lack of moisture. This condition has also adversely affected early apples. Potatoes and other crops are fair. Pastures need rain badly.

COOKER WEATHER, with general rains, has improved roots and pastures in all districts. An average crop of grain has been safely harvested. Haying operations are completed in most districts and a heavy crop harvested. Tomato canneries generally are through operations for the season; the yield and quality were average. Potatoes in most districts are of good quality and yielding heavily. McIntosh Red apples are a good crop and are being released to market under a brisk demand. Picking of winter apples has commenced in some districts.

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
