## BRITAIN MAY ADOPT TARIFF LIKE CANADA'S

### Cabinet Now Forming Plans, But Nothing Will Be Done Until Parliament Meets.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—The Cabinet has opened a series of important meetings in which the tariff plans will be determined. What decisions may be reached, however, will probably not be announced until Parliament reassembles on Feb. 2.

But influential sections of opinion urge a tariff which, in effect, would be like that of Canada, comprising three scales of duties—general tariff, intermediate, and British preferential. The general, or highest rates, would be applicable to imports from countries making no reciprocal concessions. The intermediate rates would be wholly or partly applicable to those foreign countries granting concessions to

## THREE GROUPS DIVIDED ON TARIFF ISSUE

### Differences In British Cabinet Create a Situation Without Precedent In English History.

LONDON, Jan. 22. (Canadian Press Cable)—"The Ministry will be composed of groups with three different opinions on the main subject it has to deal with," the Evening Star (Liberal) said tonight in connection with the differences in the Cabinet over tariffs. "The largest part are the avowed, and now gleeful protectionists; the second group are more or less lukewarm; the third group with the addition of Viscount Snowden as an 'elder statesman' are free traders who refuse to change their faith or believe it will become invalid.

## THE INDIAN SITUATION

### 798 Arrested To Date—Bomb Hurling At Magistrate In Calcutta.

BOMBAY, India, Jan. 22.—(A.P.)—Since the beginning of the Nationalist civil disobedience campaign and the enactment of laws to control it, 798 persons including many women have been imprisoned in the United Provinces.

In Calcutta today 85 Nationalists were sentenced to from nine months to three years imprisonment and a large number of additional arrests were made.

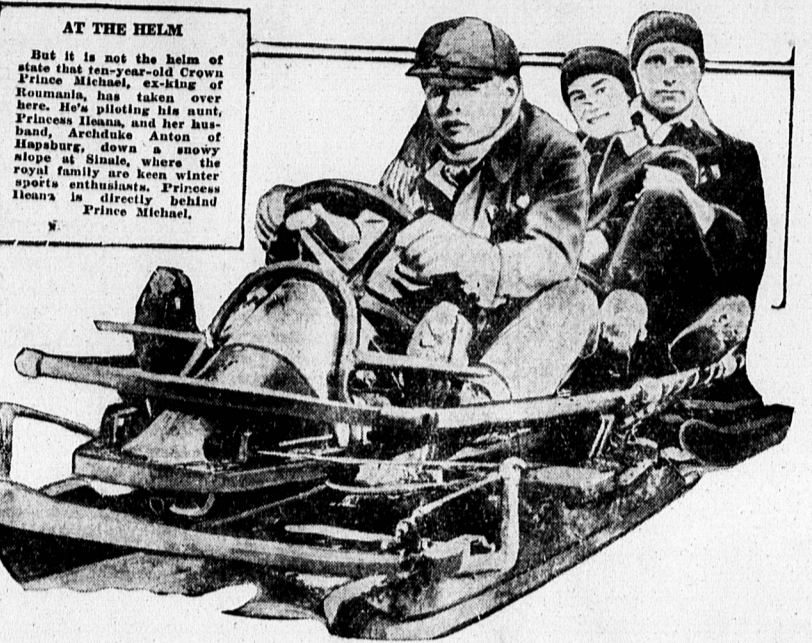
## Brothers Die In Plane Crash

## More And More Factories Are Locating In Can.

### 109 Industries Have Started Since August 1930—Capital Employed Estimated At Two Billion Dollars.

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 22.—The manufacturing situation in Canada indicates that more and more factories are locating in the Dominion from the United States and Britain, according to Norman J. Dawes, President of the Board of Trade, in his report surveying the year 1931.

So far as can be learned, Mr. Dawes said, 109 industries had located in Canada since August, 1930. There were 13 from United Kingdom and one from France.
