Italians Wonder What Became Of Mussolini's Treasure

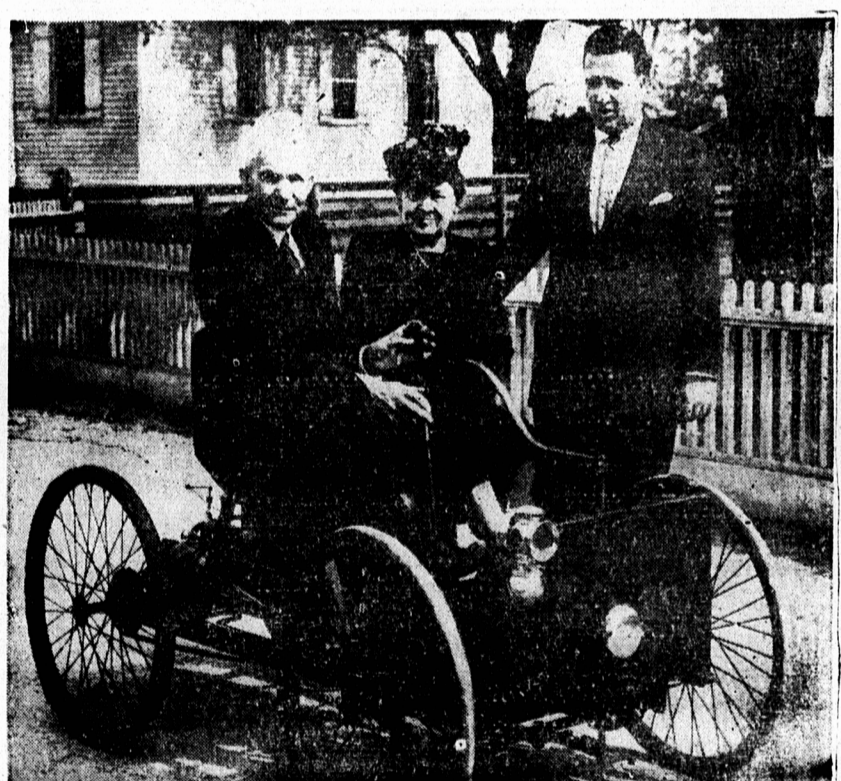
By JOHN TALBOT ROME, April 13 (Reuters)—The excitement of the hunt for Mussolini's gold and jewels, the so-called "treasure of Dongo," is swelling Italy. The tale of the treasure is a fabulous one, beginning with the shooting of Mussolini and then continuing with gold and jewels beyond price, with murders, secret documents and special files concerning outstanding European statesmen.

It began in April 1945, as the partisan forces in northern Italy closed in on the fleeing Duce. How close Mussolini was to making good his getaway is shown by the fact that Dongo, the small village where his pursuers caught up with him, is on the north-western shores of Lake Como, less than 10 miles from the Swiss frontier.

As far as can be made out, Mussolini had with him a notebook with gold covers embossed with the swastika and fasces of diamonds (a present from Hitler); a gold hunting horn, covered with rubies (a present from the former Hungarian regent, Admiral Horthy); the golden crown of the King of Abyssinia, richly encrusted with jewels; some 70 pounds of gold; a sum of money estimated at 10 milliards of lire; and some briefcases containing important state papers and personal files.

At the current exchange rate of 375 lire to the dollar, 10 milliards of lire would be worth \$28,800,000. As regards the actual cash and gold, it has been said that this was taken over by the partisan authorities, who used it to pay their men in the closing stages of the war.
