**Mounties Make Large Haul**

 QUEBEC, May 18.—A cargo of 1,200 gallons of St. Pierre and Miquelon alcohol valued at \$12,000 was taken off the 55-foot speedboat Mariner Joy after she had been beached at St. Michel, Bellechasse, opposite the Island of Orleans. The seizure was made by the customs and excise preventive service under the direction of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

When the speedboat came up the river during the night men on board caught sight of the revenue cutters Madawaska and Rinfret and immediately headed full speed

for shore. As the Mariner Joy grounded the occupants leaped on to the beach and escaped. On examination it was found a large hole had been torn in the bottom of the beached craft. She is valued at \$3,000 and is equipped with two 100 horsepower motors.

MONTREAL, May 18.—The Maritime Women's Club of Montreal brought its second year's work to a close here last night with a dinner meeting arranged for the reception of annual reports and the election of officers.

Two hundred and sixty-three women belong to the club—twenty-six from Prince Edward Island; one hundred and thirty from Nova Scotia and one hundred and seven from New Brunswick.

The financial statement disclosed receipts of \$1,420 and a balance of \$100.

Co-operating as far as possible with the Maritime Provinces Club, the organization conducted a widely varied programme for the year. It contributed \$50 to the former club which is to go toward the perpetuation of a maritime trade centre in Montreal.

**THE FEDERAL PARLIAMENT**

**Agriculture Estimate**

OTTAWA, May 18. (By the Canadian Press)—The House of Commons again took up the estimates for the Department of Agriculture this afternoon and from the start, Hon. Robert Weir, the Minister, was faced with a cross fire of questions. An item of \$390,000 for the fruit branch was passed, but time was spent on a vote of \$413,200 for "seed, feed and fertilizer control" and a grant of \$18,000 to the Canadian seed growers association.

F. G. Sanderson, (Lib. South Perth) wanted to know something about this organization and why it received the grant. Mr. Weir explained that it represented all the provinces and its aim was to keep up the production and standard of registered seeds.

A. E. McLean, (Lib. Prince) protested against the temper cent tax on fertilizer previously applied and the three per cent excise tax proposed this year under the budget resolutions.

B. F. Smith, (Cons. Victoria-Carleton) was opposed to this excise tax and had every hope it would be dropped from the budget resolutions.

The item passed.

A resolution involving expenditure of \$1,380,000 in the live stock branch precipitated an attack from Robert MacKenzie, (Lib. Assiniboia) on the general agricultural policy of the government. In 1929, he said, the livestock owned in Saskatchewan had an estimated value of \$856,000,000. In 1931 it fell to \$687,000,000 and he was convinced that at present the total value would be no more than half of the value in 1929.

Under these circumstances, Mr. MacKenzie thought, it was regrettable that there should be any great reduction in the agricultural estimates.

The New Income Tax

OTTAWA, May 18.—Officials of the income tax branch have not yet made an estimate of the revenue which will be derived from the new income tax of ten per cent on salaries of judges, officers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and officers of the Canadian military forces. A bill providing for the imposition of the tax passed the House of Commons yesterday and will soon be dealt with by the Senate.

Back To The Land

OTTAWA, May 18.—The first province to take advantage of the scheme by which the Dominion Government will join with provinces and municipalities in placing desirable unemployed families on vacant farms, may be New Brunswick. Two members of the government in that province, Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Minister of Lands and Forests, and Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works were in Ottawa last night and conferred with Hon. Wesley Gordon, Minister of Labor. No statements were given out by any of the parties to the conference but it was understood that satisfactory progress was made. The Minister announced the government's intention in regard to this branch of the unemployment relief provisions, some days ago, and all the provinces have been advised.
