Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

At the present time this Act is notoriously disregarded, and why? Let me tell the public the reasons why. For many years past, at odd intervals, some one would take the baking fever, get together a few bricks and build a small oven, or else buy a range, and straightway launch a new bakery. In most if not all these cases, the new undertaking had to put out a loaf not at all conforming to the regulation Act. This would compel the regular baker to meet unfair competition, a competition which he had no right to meet. If the "Bread Act" was properly enforced. The enforcement of the Act would put all on a level, and allow the best man to win out. The regulating and enforcing of the Act lies in the hands of the Police. Why do they not do their duty, or why are they not instructed to do it? Will you kindly publish the "Bread

The "Stone" Rebounds

Sir.—Of all the sons of men, probably none are favored, with such an amount of gratuitous advice, as those who follow the farmer's occupation. It seems to be considered the special mission of almost every other class in the community to lecture the farmer on every conceivable topic connected with his calling. Men who know little about their own business, and none whatever respecting that about which they hand down such a generous measure of cheap advice, presume to admonish the farmer on all manner of subjects, usually with an air of condescension as of those who pour out their wisdom from a height, for the benefit of inferior beings. From the callow fledgling aspiring to a cheap clerkship, to the Solon of maturer years, through every vocation and profession; the butcher, the baker, the candlestick maker, the lawyer without a brief, the doctor and the preacher, not too successful themselves at healing bodies or saving souls, all are engaged in the work of bombarding the farmer with cheap criticism and still cheaper advice.

The writer's attention has been recently directed to what may be taken as a fair specimen of this puerile nonsense an article which appeared in the Guardian some time ago entitled "Carrying the Fence Home," and written on the misnomer of "Progress." As a preliminary to the display of diluted wisdom, which he pours out so freely in your columns for the benefit of unenlightened humanity, he enumerates "other stones," such as "forest destruction" and "soil depletion," favorite themes with that class of prophets who are wise only after the event. With regard to the first of these, every intelligent observer knows that the conservation and careful management of the wood-land areas is reflected in the undiminished supply of sawn lumber at the mills everywhere throughout the country. As regards "soil depletion," it is unnecessary to inform intelligent readers, that it is not to the growing of oats, that such exhaustion is due, but to the selling of them in the raw state, a course which was unavoidable in the pioneer state of the country, and which the farmers have wisely altered, adapting themselves to changed conditions, when it becomes more profitable to market their surplus, in the form of animals and their products. If the information possessed by "Progress" was equal to the assurance with which he writes, or he would know that the crop of recent years exceeded in amount anything in the history of the Province. The range of knowledge possessed by "Progress" is shown by his statement that wild animals trespassing may be disposed of "by shooting, trapping or poisoning." If his acquaintance with the laws of the land was equal to that of every backwoods school-boy, he would be aware of the fact, that the poisoning even of wild animals is strictly prohibited, and shooting and trapping regulated by law, and confined to prescribed close seasons. In all progressive localities live stock are prohibited from running on the public roads, and so it becomes necessary to maintain road fences to restrain the animals from trespassing on the public highway, or the fields adjoining. Thus it is sad but true, that such restraint must be applied to the wandering cow of the "poor man and the widow," as she is not influenced by any sense of propriety beyond the class referred to, including (the aged parent and children) cannot be held exempt from the laws of this realm, though a sense of humanity may always be relied on, to afford them such consideration as their circumstances warrant. "The poor man with a three chain front," and several miles of fence to maintain, is unfortunately the victim not of expiring fence laws but of an unwise division of landed property, and "Progress" would add to the foolishness of the fence laws, by a suspension of the fence laws, to the detriment of all the rest of the community.

The solution of the fence problem offered is twenty-five cents worth of rope, per animal which we infer, may be translated into tethering. The animals to be so restrained, we presume, include not only the horse and humped cattle, but the sheep, the swine, the poultry, the goats and the asses. In some parts of continental Europe, where life and labor are cheap, and the peasant toils for the pleasure of the lordling, it is even the custom to tether the geese. But the method of tethering this heterogeneous family of the barnyard, is not described in such detail as we might expect from so eminent an authority as "Progress." But the climax of this remarkable epistle is reached in the statement, "The permanent fence must go." Never since Canute rebuked the waves and bade the sea retire, has anything of the kind been disposed of in such a summary manner, and with such an air of princely authority. But alas for the issue, the

permanent fence is here to stay, and the more permanent it is made the better. Consequently in recent years, and a beacon light to the dull witted fellow who tills the soil. We of the voiceless multitude have been doing with these quack nostrums so long and persistently that our souls are weary of it. We are tired of this free treatment. So now, gentlemen, please change the prescription, and let us have the rest cure.
