POLICE HEAR NO COMPLAINTS.—No reports of cars being pried open in an apparent search by thieves for articles of value was received at the Police Station, City Police said yesterday. Training School For Juveniles Is Suggested
Establishment of a training school where boys and girls might be taught a trade, was advocated yesterday by speakers at a public hearing held in the City Hall board room by the Royal Commission investigating penal institutions in Canada.

Such a school, said the speakers, Major T. Edgar McNutt, secretary of the Children's Aid Society, and Col. Keith S. Rogers, would go far toward curbing juvenile delinquency in Prince Edward Island.

The Commissioners, Mr. Justice Archambault of the Quebec Superior Court, and R. W. Craig, K. C., former Attorney-General of Manitoba, leave today for Dorchester, N. B., where they will continue interviewing prisoners at the Maritimes' only penitentiary.

"A fair proportion of our boys and girls are on their way to becoming delinquents, if something is not done," said Col. Rogers. "There is need of a trade school. The province's educational system is largely along classical lines, leading to college courses. There is very little training for boys or girls who have not the capacity for a college education."

He suggested the provincial government might regard a training school as the first step in contributing to lessening of delinquency.

Both speakers said stamping of training schools as "reform schools" had a bad psychological effect on boys who came from them.

The Children's Aid Society had had about 150 wards in the last 20 years, most of them sent to either of the two Halifax industrial schools, Major McNutt said. An agent of the Society visited each one of the wards yearly, he said.

Premier Thane A. Campbell explained the Government's stand on the training school question. The federal Department of Justice had designated the proposed jail farm as a purely provincial matter, he said and his government felt it was not justified in incurring the expense entailed by immediate establishment of a farm.
