The many friends of Mary Hadda, beloved wife of J. James McFarland, will read with regret of her early death, which occurred at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Alton, Sussex, N. B. on Saturday, Aug. 18th, of Bright's Disease. Mrs. McFarland has resided in Hartford, Conn., for a few years, and about a year and a half ago came to visit her native home where she was taken ill, and despite all that tender nursing and medical skill could do death claimed her for its victim at the early age of 27 years. She leaves to mourn their loss a grief-stricken husband, father and mother, two sisters and four brothers who do not mourn as those without hope for they feel the assurance that she has gone to a better and a far more prepared for those that love the Lord. The funeral took place on Monday, Aug. 18th, at 2:00 p. m., the services being conducted by Rev. Frank Baird. The remains were laid to rest in Kirk Hill cemetery. To the bereaved relatives and friends the entire community extends its heartfelt sympathy. The deceased was a granddaughter of the late John and Margaret Crockett, of Carleton P. E. I.

EARNEST Gough gave a very interesting lecture in Epworth Hall Friday night on "The British Scout and his work in South Africa." He first referred to the duties of the scout being the most important of any individual in modern warfare. He cited times when one scout has caused the changing of positions and conditions of a whole army. It is an office eagerly sought after, but few are capable. The scout must have a good deal better qualification than the ordinary soldier. He needs to be a good soldier, be active, perfectly sound physically, have good eyesight, be able to ride well, swim etc., etc. The scout must have a knowledge of the country; it is not always safe to follow maps, for there are often changes in the names of places and conditions of countries; in inquiring the way he will often be misinformed. Much depends upon his compass, yet in some mineral countries this instrument will vary. The lecturer dwelt upon the quickness of sight of the scout; his eyes are always in motion; he is always taking observations; no object escapes his notice, and through practice he can see a much greater distance than other men, discern characters when the ordinary man could not see anything. The use of the ear is also a very important faculty, and when any moving object could not be seen is heard by placing the ear close to the ground. In this particular Mr. Gough told of how scouts have been able to tell the numbers of horses, dismounted men, cattle and vehicles, when they could not be seen. And often when things could neither be seen or heard, the sense of smell plays an important part; so also does the sense of touch, as with the hands or feet on the ground. The necessity of not letting the enemy's scout see you was touched upon, and the need of moving rapidly when not under cover, and halting when under cover to take observations; selecting ground or objects near the color of his clothing to pass by; always keeping different ways of escape open. The speaker pictured the Zulu scout climbing to the highest elevation, raising his head gradually inch by inch and when afraid of being detected holding himself perfectly still so that he might be mistaken for a stone or other object. At considerable length Mr. Gough dwelt upon the important part of tracking, how could he learned the position and condition of the pursued by the nature of the footmarks even to denoting the pace. Zulus, he said, claim to be able to tell from footprints the age of the tracks and which sex they were made by. Tracking is like reading; all little signs are put together to form a meaning. Often little signs are put to great advantage; little signs which the ordinary traveller would pass unnoticed are put to serious account by the trained scout. The lecture from beginning to end was very descriptive of the work of the scout upon whom in these days depends much of the success of failure of an army at war. At the close of the lecture ice cream and cake were served.
