ISAY STEEL TRUST CONTROLS CAPITAL OF \$15,000,000

NEW YORK, May 10.—The investigation of the Interstate Commerce Commission into the charges brought by the Alpha Portland Cement Company against the Baltimore & Ohio railroad alleging discrimination in favor of the cement plants of the steel corporation, took a new turn yesterday when representatives of western cement manufacturers appeared and opposed any reduction in freight rates to the Alpha and other eastern cement companies. The western manufacturers claimed the eastern cement makers were obtaining better freight rates. The western cement makers were not permitted, however, to become a party to this suit. Counsel for the Alpha company submitted a statement today which alleged that the steel corporation through its directors controlled companies with a capitalization of \$15,000,000,000.

WORK OF VANDAL

PARIS, May 10.—An individual named Vigoroux, profiting by the temporary absence of an attendant, today broke a Græco-Roman statue of Esculapian, and cut a portrait of Michael Angelo by an Italian master in the Louvre. THE MOUSTACHE OF THE CURATE

LONDON, May 10.—By the removal of his moustache, Rev. E. R. Whalley, one of the four curates of All Souls', Harlesden, has avoided what might have been a serious dilemma.

The vicar of the parish, Rev. W. P. Cromland, complained that the curate has shaved it off in deference to the views expressed by himself. The curate disclaims any pastoral authority in so personal a matter; a premature visitation of Father Time turning his moustache grey is, he says, the sole cause of his action.

"It was at the Easter Vestry," said the vicar, "that I was able to announce to the assembled parishioners that Mr. Whalley had consented, in deference to my wishes, to remove his moustache. The announcement was received with much applause. It is eminently desirable, in my opinion, that there should be unanimity of thought and action among the clergy here, and as Mr. Whalley was the only one of the five who was not clean shaven I have made representations to him since November last, when he first came among us, that he should come into line."

"I think a clergyman's voice can be heard more distinctly without a moustache. On broad principles I think that a clergyman is much better without a moustache, or else clean shave. Some clergy have curious views on the subject. I have an uncle, a canon in the north of England, who affects long sideburns of the Dundreary type, but he shaves the moustache in order to let his voice have full scope."

Rev. E. R. Whalley said: "The fact is it was beginning to go grey. The vicar has certainly made some indirect allusions, but he has never made a direct request that I should remove it. The late Dr. Macraigan, archbishop of York, refused to ordain any candidate for the priesthood who wore a moustache. But I say that not all the bishops and vicars in England could compel me to remove my moustache if I had not reasons of my own for doing so."

"My wife," added Mr. Whalley, "somewhat demurely, 'has not yet made up her mind whether she prefers me with or without it.'"

STOLE \$115,000

CLEVELAND, O., May 10.—For alleged speculators amounting to nearly \$115,000 Julius W. Hopkins, paying teller of the First National Bank, was placed under arrest last yesterday. He was arrested on a warrant issued by United States District Attorney Day, which specifically charged him with the theft of \$60,000 from the bank. When arraigned before United States Commissioner Walthier the accused waived a preliminary hearing and was bound over to await the action by the grand jury. Bond was fixed at \$60,000. He was unable to give bail and went to jail.

It is claimed that later teller Hopkins confessed to District Attorney Day, Federal Bank Examiner Henry A. Williams, and officials of the bank that during the last eight years, he had embezzled a total of \$144,850 of the institution's funds. It is asserted that he claimed to have lost the money in unsuccessful business deals.

Charles E. Barnsworth, cashier of the First National Bank, made the following statement: "One of our trusted employees, Julius W. Hopkins, is a defaulter in the sum of \$114,850, which amount he has abstracted from express packages containing currency sent by the National Banking Department at Washington. The bank is fully protected by a blanket guaranty policy issued by London Lloyds, so that the loss of this defalcation will not fall upon the bank. The facts will be placed before the public officials for such action as they deem it proper to take with reference to Mr. Hopkins."

The officials say that according to his alleged confession, Hopkins, by juggling his entry accounts succeeded in evading disclosure. Most of the embezzled money, bank officials say, was invested in a manufacturing concern of which Hopkins was the head. Hopkins is thirty-seven years old, a widower and has a son.

Friends who saw Hopkins in his cell say he told them he would plead guilt and "take his medicine without a fight."
