War—25 Years Ago Today

(By The Canadian Press)

APRIL 20, 1915—Severe fighting reported in Alsace hills with French taking the initiative. Announced 23 British divisions, 18 infantry and five cavalry, held 36 miles of line on the Western Front. Armenian revolt began at Van.

APRIL 21, 1915—British held Hill 60 in Ypres salient against violent and frequent German counter-attacks; enemy losses in four days estimated between 3,000 and 4,000 men. Spring floods halted Russian advance through Carpathian passes into Hungary.
