**6,000 Believed Zero And Sub-zero Temperatures In Eastern Canada**

(By The Canadian Press)  
Zero and sub-zero temperatures came to Eastern Canada yesterday, while across practically the entire Dominion clear and cold weather prevailed.

Winter was late in coming to most of the East, but when it did come it sent the mercury down to 10 degrees below at Quebec City and 12 below at Three Rivers, Quebec, and Ottawa shivered in temperatures five degrees above zero and a further drop was predicted early today.

Moderately cold weather was the rule in Western Canada, where some light snow flurries fell. Saskatchewan and Alberta temperatures clung to the zero mark, while Manitoba's readings were slightly milder.

Sanding crews worked on Ontario highways and garages were given rush business to accommodate motorists whose cars froze in it.

In Nova Scotia the temperature was a mean 13 above last night and at Saint John, N. B., it was 12 above, compared with sub-zero temperatures in some parts of New Brunswick. Prince Edward Island reported a reading of eight degrees above, the coldest of the year.
