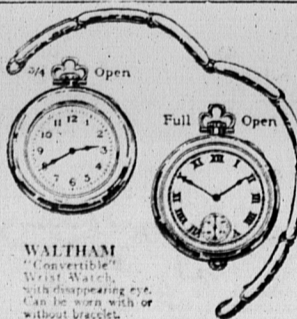

### 79,527 BRITISH CASUALTIES IN PAST MONTH

LONDON, Jan. 4.—British casualties reported in December reached a total of 79,527, divided as follows:

Killed or died of wounds—Officers, 1,045; men, 14,805; wounded or missing—Officers, 2,342; men, 60,335.

Casualties reported from December 26 to 31 were 9,571, divided as follows:

Killed or died of wounds—Officers, 65; men, 2,059.

Wounded or missing—Officers, 238; men, 7,589.

British casualties this month show a marked decrease from November, reflecting the slowing down of operations with the coming of winter. The total for last month was 129,989, the highest in five months, owing to the severe fighting on the Cambrai front.

The figures for the last six days of December are much lower than for the preceding six days. The report for the period December 19-24 gave a total of 13,915.

### TO REVOLUTIONIZE INDUSTRY OF BRITAIN

LONDON, Jan. 4.—Proposals which would revolutionize the industry of Great Britain are contained in a report of the Coal Conservation Sub-Committee on the Supply of Electrical Power. The main reforms advocated are as follows:

Construction of 16 super-power stations in different parts of the country.

Suppression, with adequate compensation, of 600 small undertakings now in existence.

Utilization of the by-products at east of the big stations.

National control of the whole undertaking by a national board of electricity commissioners.

Lord Haldane, chairman of the sub-committee, strongly recommends that these actions should be taken without delay. The primary object of the scheme is to economize the country's coal supplies.

The amount of coal used in the United Kingdom for production of electricity is 80,000,000 tons. A national scheme, such as is proposed, would save 55,000,000 tons of this. It is calculated that with the saving of by-products now wasted by burning coal to open grates and boiler furnaces, a national economy of \$500,000,000 a year would be effected.

The committee foresees, as a result of the national system of electric power supply a great increase of the use of electricity for all purposes, with many advantageous results.

Factory chimneys would gradually disappear, railways would be electrified, even for the haulage of goods; train smoke would disappear from towns and coal wagons would need to run no further than the electric power stations. Electric light would be cheap enough for the poorest and there would be a large increase in the use of electric heat and power for household purposes.

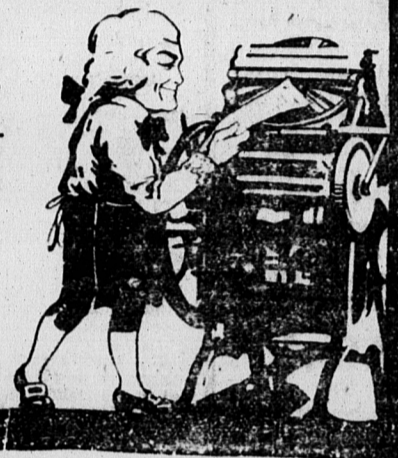
