DEBATE ON THE BUDGET SPEECH

Hon. Mr. Gordon Replied to the Speech of the Leader

He Was Followed by Hon Mr. Simpson who was Speaking When the House Adjourned at Eleven.

Hon. Mr. Gordon, approved of the optimistic outlook that the Premier had taken. He says we are soon to get a large amount of money. We are now suffering under a heavy debt and he hoped his predictions would be realized. We regret that the Premier's visit to England did not result in his enlightening. He had been disappointed in not seeing the Coronation and we too have been disappointed. Last year the taxes had been increased and yet we have a deficit of over \$12,000,000. The people expected a surplus and the leader says we had \$300,000 surplus, but this is a strange statement with a capital account of \$12,000,000 made of items formerly charged to ordinary expenditure. The people want the old form of book keeping - expenditure and revenue balanced. The people are disappointed at the situation. Money borrowed from the public is lying without interest being paid; so there must be a large balance due and the public could form some estimate with interest for nine or ten years. The income tax burden was formerly hard enough to bear but it has been increased 50%. The Premier speaks of the progress in all the Provinces, but no credit can be claimed for this. Immigrants have been flocking in and spending money. But in our own Province the young are leaving by thousands, and this he laid to the charge of the Government. In other times the Conservatives had been blamed for the exodus, but now it was ten times as much. The picture was not as bright as the Premier had pictured it. True the cheese factories had done much to them we must look with hope. All Liberal Governments are going behind and seeking for means by which to live. Now an assault is to be made on Ottawa, but even if money does come there is no cause for boasting. We must pay it back, it is simply taking it out of one pocket and putting it into the other. Even if we get \$70,000 what is that with the debt of nearly \$700,000. He did not think we would get the Fishery Award. We have then a dark picture ahead. By the \$300,000 received for winter communication we have given away our claims - and this winter we have lost much more than that in decreased trade with Sydney and other places. The leader had referred to increased cost in living, increase in salaries, etc. but he remembered the time when leading officials lived at a much smaller salary than at present. The anticipation of \$1,500,000 from the Fishery Award should not be counted on, for we may be doomed to disappointment. The question of representation was a very important one for some time soon we may have more representatives. He was glad to see such an able lawyer engaged to assist our Attorney General. He hoped he would come back with something more satisfactory than hopes. The people should be well satisfied that the asylum was so well conducted; but it was a sad commentary that we had so many insane men and women. The cause should be inquired. An eminent doctor - Dr. Gillis of Summerside - in the House who has passed away and agreed with him that the cause was to a large extent the immoderate use of tobacco and strong tea. He did not think members would complain at the installation of an electric plant in the Asylum but the fixtures of that might also be destroyed. He was willing that all credit be given the Premier and the Board of Trade for their action in the winter steamers. But for them the boats might be on the shores of Nova Scotia or P. E. Island. In dealing with the public accounts he thought with so many officials, clerical mistakes in addition etc., which he pointed out, should not be made. He agreed with the Premier that so long as the roads were managed as at present there would be complaints. The road parts should not be ploughed up as is done but instead the low parts should be repaired and the drains opened. On the question of education he congratulated the Superintendent, Dr. Anderson who was doing a good work. The great regret is that the young who are being taken away - the great majority to the United States, to build up a foreign country. Reference has been made to the progress in agriculture. In King's County where he lived the wealthy farmers are doing well but the great mass are not progressing. He failed to see any great effect from the institution. He had not seen the live stock imported, but if they are good it is all right. He was pleased the Premier had viewed the situation with great hopefulness, hope long continued, and he hoped when the Premier returned from Ottawa he would tell a better story than to night. Hon. Mr. SIMPSON was the next speaker. He discussed the financial condition of our own Province. The leader had spoken moderately on the surplus and might have made the showing even a better one than he had. The expenditure on roads had been attacked severely but here we had a very great saving during the past two years, not effected, however, by neglect of the roads. Under the present administration the saving was more than the cost of the statute labor. In the expenditure of the maintenance of the asylum the saving considering the

increased number of patients is great. In Conservative rule the expenditure per head averaged \$141 while in Liberal rule it was only \$114, thus effecting a saving each year of over \$5,000 and that with a greatly improved institution. The leader of the Opposition had taken objection to the increase in salaries, but he should remember it was his party who had in many cases increased the salaries. If any blame was to be attached it cannot be laid at the door of the Liberal administration. At eleven o'clock Hon. Mr. Simpson moved the adjournment of the debate. (Continued on Page Eight.)

WON MARATHON RACE.

BOSTON, April 21.-Of the fifty-five sturdy runners who started from Ashland at noon yesterday in the Boston Athletic Association's annual 26 mile run to this city at the Marathon race, 40 crossed the finish line the majority in good condition, with John C. Lorden, of the Cambridgeport gymnasium, in the lead and a winner of the coveted gold medal. While Lorden ran a grand race overhauling man after man until he finally strode into the lead, a mile from the finish, the feature of the day was the great running duel between John F. Caffery, of Hamilton, Ont., who holds the record, and Samuel A. Miller, Jr., of the Mohawk A. C., of New York, and the winner of last year's contest. Miller ran his opponent off his feet and Caffery dropped out about ten miles from the finish. The terrific pace also proved exhausting to Miller and when Lorden who had played a waiting game, came up and challenged him within two miles of the finish, the New Yorker had little strength to respond. Lorden took the lead about a mile from the finish and held it.
