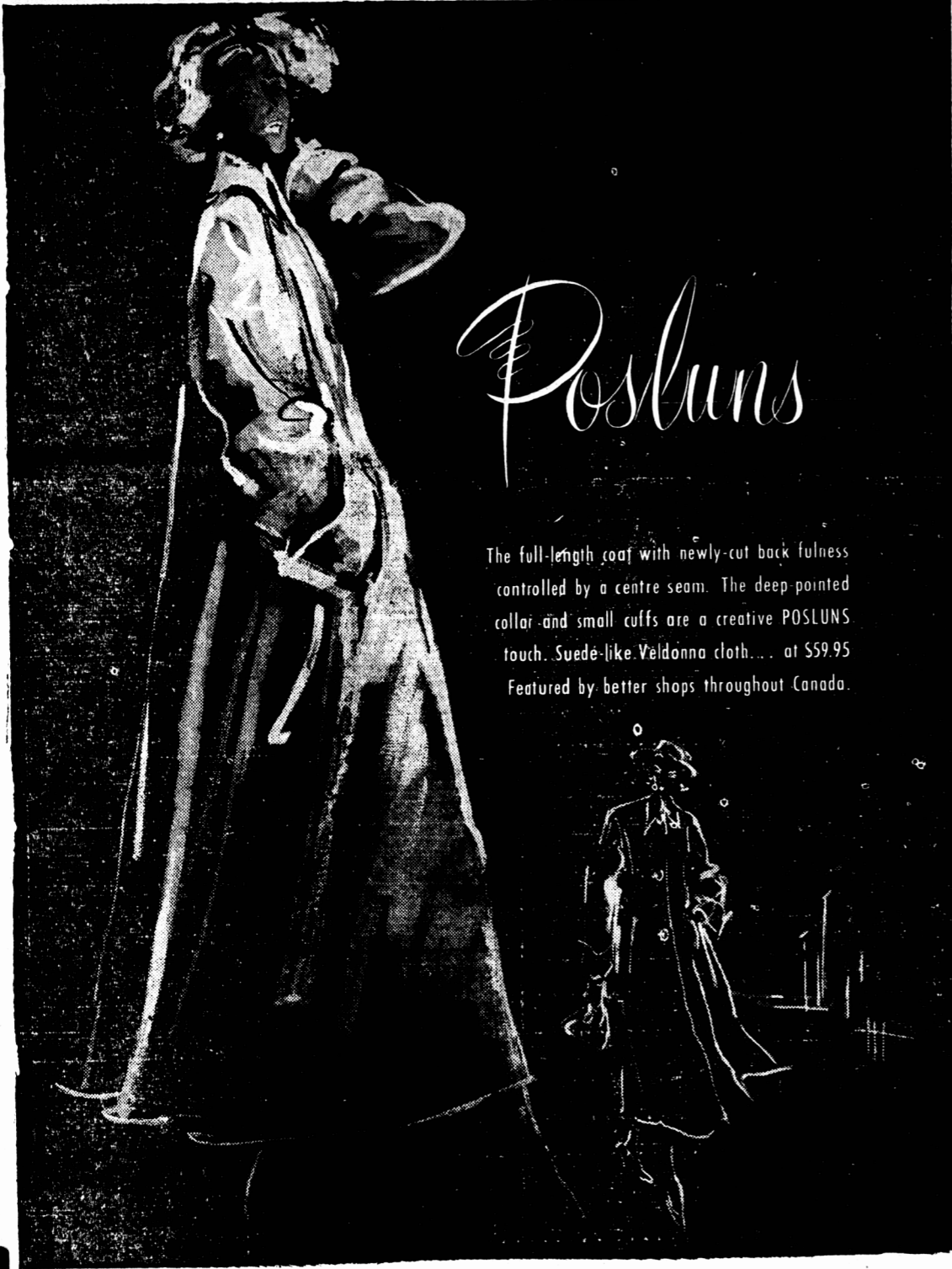

NEW GLASGOW — John J. Newbury, 52-year-old native of Charlottetown and resident of New Glasgow for many years, was killed in a fall here Monday afternoon. The accident occurred at the C. N. R. siding near Matheson's Foundry where New-

bury, in a company with other workers, was unloading lumber from a railway car. In some manner Newbury fell from the car to the roadbed. Death was due to a broken neck. A resident of New Glasgow for over 35 years, Newbury was an employee of the C. N. R. carpenter shop. He attended the Church of

England and was a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. He was unmarried and boarded at the home of Mrs. Leo Callaghan, 151 Victoria Street, from where the funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock. The deceased is survived by two half brothers in Stellarton, Gus and Charlie Newbury.
