(Continued from page 1) Mr. Leo McDonald, the newly-elected President, asked for an expression of opinion on the proposition which was made at the C. T. F. of holding the national convention biennially instead of annually.

The stand was taken that whereas this province benefits more than the other provinces from the annual meetings yet the affairs of the C. T. F. might be equally well attended to by a meeting of the executive in the year between the meetings. It was also felt that the biennial plan would help conserve finances, thus giving the organization more power.

A resolution was finally passed moved by Mr. C. B. Jelly and seconded by Mr. Lowther that the Island delegates go to Edmonton with an open mind on the matter, but empowered to speak on biennial lines.

Mr. J. H. Morrison called attention to the magazine the "Alberta School" which is henceforth to be made Dominion wide, and which contains a vast amount of material useful to teachers.

Mr. C. B. Jelly urged that all teachers join the Federation, as the organization works not only for its members but for all the teachers of the province.

The President felt that if the teachers are not united the government will pay no attention to them. The teachers should attempt to use their influence with the people of the province now while they are in a reasoning attitude. This is the 50th anniversary and it is hoped that it will be a real jubilee year for the teachers. He expressed the hope that any teacher when called upon by the executive to work on a committee or for any kind of service would be prompt and willing in response.
