A., will be of interest to his friends especially in Prince Edward Island as the Mr. McLeod referred to is a son of Mrs. George D. McLeod and the late George D. McLeod of Hunter River, also a brother of the late Second Lieutenant Elmer G. McLeod of the R. F. C. "James C. McLeod to be Republican candidate for Senator in Third District. This is the time of year when candidates must file. If they intend to enter the primaries on Sept. 23rd the final date for state offices is July 23rd and for local places on the ticket July 23rd. Up to the present time there has been no rumour in Littleton or a fact in any North Country town. However, among those who have filed are James C. McLeod, Republican candidate for state senator and Fred O. Nowise, Democratic candidate for representative. Both men are well known in Littleton. Mr. McLeod is one of Littleton's successful business men, having been in business here since 1904. Ten years after he bought the Littleton Variety Store and established what is now McLeod's Department Store, doing an extensive business all over the North Country. He has been especially successful in organization, having a local corps of employees that has aided him in building up his business. Mr. McLeod represented his home town in the last session of the legislature and has held other offices of trust in Littleton, being chairman of the water and light commission, a director of the Savings Bank and of the Holly Shoe Company."
